HILO JOURNAL.

One can imagine what a grand ride we can have by what we already have on the Volcano road. A ride for 29 miles over such a splendid road. But I imagine that part built by Marlin will wear the best, as it has been built by more stone and less earth used in filling up. The rest of the road looks as well built, but time will tell. Marlin has been weighed in the balance and not found wanting. The work progresses slowly. The camp will be moved soon to the 15th mile, and there it is said there will be a trail cut to the old road, so that the ride on horse back will be considerably shortened. We hope the new Legislature will order more active work on the road and not continue the agony so long.

It is pleasant to see so many homesteads on the line of the road. The Half-way House is an institution where passengers leave carriages for horses, fifteen miles to ride over a trail. The house is owned by Mr. Mr. J. R. Wilson, who provides the carriages and horses by which to get to the Volcano and return. Mr. and Mrs. Amarat keep the house and grounds in splendid condition. The floors are clean enough to eat on them; the table cloth as white as the whitest snow, and good wholesome lunch provided for all passengers going to and coming back from the crater, with ample time to rest. The house is two stories high with a cook house adjoining. A large dining, or lunch room occupies the first floor. On the second floor two rooms, in which there are three beds, which are also very clean and comfortable looking. The hostess seems to know just how to wait on travelers, and speaks English fluently. When it becomes necessary the building will be enlarged. There are ten acres owned by Mr. Wilson so that plenty of vegetables can be raised for the use of the house if in time it should be desired. People would like to stay at this pleasing locality for a few days, if sufficient inducement is offered them to do so. When the road is completed some people will wish to walk the whole distance to the Volcano, resting at the Half-way House, and that will make it an inducement to add accommodations for travelers.

The Edison phonograph which came here by last kinan under charge of Mr. Stockie, and operated by him, is drawing crowds of people who are greatly delighted and filled with wonder, for it is a truly wonderful invention. It reminds one of the old saying that wonders will never cease. The Hawaiians are going wild in their praises of it and the operator is employed all the time. I imagine that before he leaves here every man, woman and child will have seen it, as his charge is within the means of all. At present he occupies a store. Will exhibit at court house and at private houses when desired.

HEATHEN REACTION.

The Hawaiian Board department in the Friend contains this confession: "We must take our share of the blame for the late outbreak on Lanai, for the few people of that island have for years been left to themselves almost unvisited of any Christian workers."
And this is an item referring to Honolulu.

"Another class of people in their way quite as isolated from good influence as were those Lanai natives are some of our sailors of the coast trade—nine of these men are supporting a hula master and kahuna. He has his pa hula (hula quarters) not over a mile in a straight line from the Post Office. One of the girls he is instructing is a member of one of our public schools. A native being asked if they went to any of our churches, said, "No, they are wild, they are Mormon, and one of them has been to Salt Lake City." In connection with this hula school situated in our town the worship of the god Laka is carried on, the inspiration of his spirit being necessary to the proper and successful prosecution of the work."

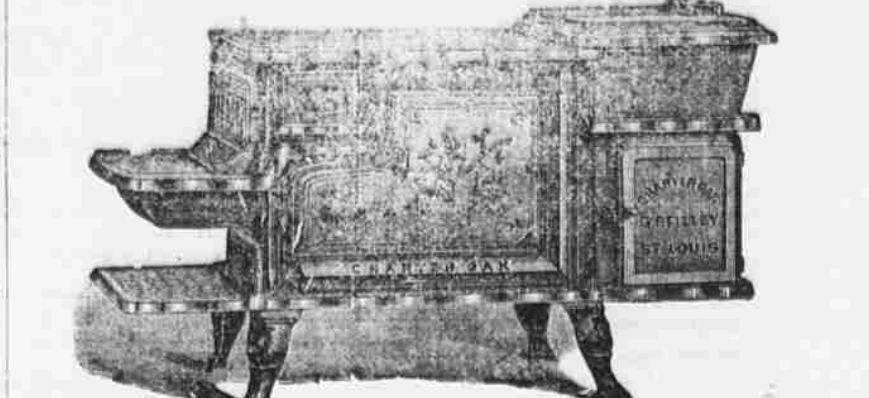
