At the Police Station he was told that if the men were apprehended and brought safely to the Police Station, their captors would receive \$20. An hour later the deserters were being marched to the Police Station at the muzzle of a double-barreled old-fashioned musket, a gun which the old native asserted belonged to one of the ancient chiefs.

The Honolulu Zither and Musical Club will meet for practice at Arion Hall at 7:30 to-night.

QUEEN street near Alakea street has been widened by the cutting away of part of the Wilcox premises.

A GRAND picnic is to be given by the Honolulu Arion at Remond Grove on Saturday evening, 26th inst.

A MEETING of the Kahuku Plantation Co. will be held to-morrow at 2 o'clock, at the Chamber of Commerce room.

HOUSEHOLD furniture at the residence of F. May, King street, will be sold by J. F. Morgan at 10 o'clock Friday.

The steamer Waialeale from Kauai arrived this afternoon and reports nothing unusual except a little rough weather.

The household furniture of O. Benson, on Beretania, near Nuuanu street, will be sold at auction to-morrow by J. F. Morgan.

A SPECIMEN of bananas grown in Central America is on exhibition in the Hawaiian News Co.'s window. It is small, but, but, good.

THE Scottish Thistle Club will be a year old on April 27, and will hold an anniversary social the evening of the nearest regular meeting, Monday, the 25th.

Mr. Thomas Lindsay, jeweler, has struck a neat badge for members of the Scottish Thistle Club—a silver lapel button showing the form of a thistle.

MECHANIC Engine Co. are so jubilant over their victory in the race to the fire this morning that they have called a meeting to be held this evening. The steamer is flying.

It is rumored that a warrant has been issued for the arrest of August Dreier, for failure to return a sworn statement of election expenses. The rumor cannot, however, as yet be officially verified.

Most of the whaling fleet have set sail for the colder regions of the Arctic. The beautiful panorama of the fleet cruising about off shore has therefore been diminished nearly to the vanishing point.

THE departure of the steamer Kinau this afternoon was witnessed by an unusually large crowd. Eleven tourists were passengers for the volcano, besides a large number for way ports. Among passengers for the volcano were the Revs. W. P. and Thos. Kirby.

THE O. R. & L. Co. have added a canoe race to the program for March 17th and have three entries thereof already. J. J. Williams has offered as a prize to the winning crew of the six-oared sliding seat boat race, a large photograph of the crew and the Pacific Hardware Co. have offered to frame the picture.

THE proprietor of a leading che fa bank in Honolulu, a Chinaman, was up in the Police Court this morning, charged with violating a section of the laws pertaining to gaming, viz., in running a che fa bank. The Courtroom was crowded with natives, who are taking a great interest in the trial. A. P. Peterson appeared for defendant.

OWING to the banco session of the Supreme Court, the application for probate of the will of the late Right Rev. Herman Koekemann, Bishop of Olla, due for hearing to-morrow morning, will not be heard by the Chief Justice until to-morrow afternoon, at two o'clock. The subscribing witnesses will therefore take due notice.

HEATHEN CEREMONY.

An unusual ceremony was witnessed by a large gathering of people at Haalihamanu bridge this afternoon. Two boats, manned by boat boys, having as passengers several Chinese, some of whom were dressed in joss-house habiliments, and accompanied by a frightful looking image and a band of musicians, were the focus of attraction. The Chinese on-lookers seemed to be very reticent in furnishing information about the racket, but it is generally believed that it was gotten up for the purpose of appeasing the anger of the gods, who helped to drown a couple of Chinamen not long ago.

LANTERN EXHIBITIONS.

The Scottish Thistle Club, at last meeting, resolved to give a couple of optical lantern entertainments in aid of the newspaper and periodical fund of the club, to take place about the beginning of next month—most probably on Saturday evenings of 2d and 9th April. The views to be shown are of the best quality obtainable and will be extremely interesting to the Sons both of Saint Andrew and Saint George, and at the same time prove a treat to their American and Hawaiian cousins. Particulars will be announced later.

A MORNING BLAZE.

House Belonging to J. A. Magoon at Palama Destroyed.

Shortly after 3:30 o'clock this morning a fire occurred in a wooden building on King street, Palama, near Hon. J. I. Dowsett's residence. An alarm was rung from the Bell Tower acquainting all with the fact that the fire demon had again visited the city. People were roused from their slumber and many hastened to the scene.

Mechanic Engine Co. No. 2's engine was the first to emerge from its station and covered the distance in remarkably quick time. Engine Co. No. 1's engine reached the spot four minutes after No. 2. Water was soon thrown on the burning building and owing to there being no wind the fire was quickly brought under control. A part of the building is still standing as a monument of the efficient work done by the fire ladders. On-lookers say, however, that if there had been any wind at all the adjoining buildings, of which there were several, would have gone.

The premises are known as the Keau estate, having been formerly the property of Hon. James Keau, who is now in Samoa. The land was sold at auction some time ago and was bought by Lau Chong and W. C. Achi for \$8000. Later the property was purchased by Mr. J. A. Magoon and is at present owned by him. The building was insured with the Union Fire & Marine Insurance Co. of New Zealand, of which Hon. J. S. Walker is the agent. The cause of the fire is unknown, as the place was untenanted. The supposition, however, is that some girls and boys have made that place a carousing ground and in one of their rackets accidentally set fire to the place.
