## ANSWER TO MR. HORNER.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—  
J. M. Horner in the BULLETIN of  
April 7, says: "Our imagination is  
amplified to truthfully picture the scene  
likely to occur when the check was  
first given to the rum traffic by the  
Kansas prohibition law."

Instead of prohibition in Kansas  
checking the sale of liquors, the re-  
cords of the Internal Revenue Col-  
lector's office at Leavenworth shows  
the number of retail liquor stamps is-  
sued in Kansas for the year ending  
April 30, 1887, was 2997 as against  
1884 in the year ending April 30,  
1881, a gain of 1103 places where  
liquor was sold in prohibition Kansas.  
There was simply a change of name  
from saloon to drugstore, where  
liquors can be bought from a drink  
to a gallon, at the present time.  
That is a "check" with a vengeance.

Mr. Horner again says: "It is  
well attested that the alcoholic drink  
traffic struggles persistently against  
its enemies—dies hard," etc. The  
wine trade in Uncle Sam's domain  
has never even been sick; but on the  
contrary is healthy, and largely  
patronized by a large class of probi-  
hibition hypocrites; who keep their  
jug of rum in the cupboard, and  
drink it on the sly. They sing probi-  
hibition in public and tattle in secret.

Mr. Horner is responsible for the  
following statements made by Gov.  
Humphrey of Kansas: "The growth  
of public sentiment in support of  
constitutional prohibition in Kansas  
is steady and unmistakable. In the  
last campaign no political party had  
the temerity to demand a re-sub-  
mission of the question to the people  
in the face of a popular verdict that  
has been repeated and emphasized  
every time the people's verdict has  
been taken." If the above state-  
ments were made by Gov. Humphrey,  
we can only add, that for reasons  
best known to himself, it is quite clear  
to any impartial man that Gov. Hum-  
phrey knowingly stated a wilful false-  
hood when he submitted his message  
to the Kansas Legislature.

Senator Ingalls of Kansas in his  
late reply to the N. Y. Voice said:  
"To prevent the issue clearly I affirm:  
1—That there is no town of impor-  
tance in Kansas where beer, whisky  
and other intoxicating drinks cannot  
be had and are not sold as a bever-  
age. There may be some hamlets  
where this is not true, but not even  
many of these. 2—That in the  
principal cities of the State the  
drumshop traffic is recognized, and  
practically licensed, by the imposi-  
tion of monthly 'fines,' which are  
regularly applied to the payment of  
the expenses of the municipal govern-  
ment. 3—That the brewery,  
which in a test case the Supreme  
Court of the United States held the  
State has the power to suppress and  
destroy, had been, and now is, in  
constant, uninterrupted and profit-  
able operation. 4—That these facts  
are known to the State officials, to  
the boards of police commissioners ap-  
pointed by the Governor, upon oath,  
to enforce the prohibitory law, and  
to the people generally."

A correspondent of the Christian  
Union writing from Lewis, Kansas,  
says: "You make some comments on  
Mr. Ingalls' assertion that 'Prohibi-  
tion does not prohibit in Kansas.' In  
all his words, Mr. Ingalls never  
spoke a more strangely truthful  
truth." The correspondent goes on  
in the same strain, also fortifying  
the letter of Senator Ingalls.

Again, I will ask friend Horner  
one simple question. How can a  
person claim to be a Christian, and  
at the same time advocate prohibi-  
tion, when God is on record, in op-  
position to prohibition? "Prohibition  
practically repudiates the Bible, im-  
pugns the wisdom and impeaches the  
character of God the Father, arraigns  
Jesus Christ as a criminal, and stultifies  
the Christian world by placing it  
in the attitude of worshipping One  
whose recorded action is in violation  
of the criminal law." S. S.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

During the process of deepening the  
channel at the entrance to Honolulu  
harbor the Dredger will be in opera-  
tion night and day. At night there  
will be a danger signal placed on the  
forward derrick of the Dredger about 30  
feet above sea level, which can be seen  
by all vessels approaching the harbor.

The signal consists of Red Red  
of three red lights \* White  
and a white light \*  
as in the diagram, the red lights being  
about 3 feet apart with the white light  
in the center. Red

stop at a safe distance from the Dred-  
ger and give one blast of their whistle  
which will be answered by a single  
blast
