Diamond Head, 3 p.m.—Weather hazy, wind fresh east; barkentine Tropic Bird off port.
 Engine Companies Nos. 1 and 2 will hold their regular monthly meeting this evening.

Purser Laurio J. Ryan, of the S. S. Australia, has the thanks of the Bulletin for news favors.

Nearly all the plantations on Kauai are closed, only two are running at the present time.

The band will play at the Hawaiian Hotel this evening for the benefit of passengers by the Australia.

The Kinau brought a large list of passengers from Maui and Hawaii to-day—80 cabin and 79 steerage.

Tamayana, a Japanese belonging to Hawaii, was committed to the Insane Asylum this morning on the evidence of Dr. Chas. Peterson that his mind was affected.

The night-blooming cereus at Oahu College will be in bloom this evening for the last time this season. There will be 7000 or 8000 blossoms and the sight will be worth seeing.

The Queen's birthday, Sept. 21, was generally observed on Kauai. Work was suspended on all the plantations, although nothing special was billed in commemoration of the day.

Rev. and Mrs. Bishop Willis returned from Hawaii by the steamer Kinau this morning, to welcome the Misses Adeline and Beatrice Willis, who were passengers by the S. S. Australia.

Mr. and Mrs. P. C. Jones and family returned to their island home by the S. S. Australia this morning. They all look well, more especially Mr. Jones, whose shadow has not diminished.

Emily Kaihuna, a hard nut, was arrested yesterday afternoon for slapping Miss Cullen. Emily stated in Court this morning that such was the case, but she had been given provocation. She was reprimanded and discharged.

Ted Pritchard, the English middle-weight champion who defeated Jem Smith, was knocked out by Jem Hall, the Australian middle-weight, on August 19th, in London, in four rounds. The fight was for \$5,000. Jem Hall passed through here some time ago.

A 60-pound Dahlgren shell and about half a dozen flatirons have been brought up from the bay by the dredge. The coral encrustation on the flatirons is supposed to be of thirty years' growth. They are on exhibition in Benson, Smith & Co.'s drugstore.

Two young boys, Kapela and Kama, escaped from the Reformatory school on Saturday last. They were quickly apprehended and this morning Kapela was given a change of residence to Oahu Prison, while Kama was given an extra three months in the school at the expiration of his former sentence.

THE LEGISLATURE.

EIGHTY-FOURTH DAY.
 WEDNESDAY, SEPT. 7, 1892.
 Morning Session.

Assembly convened promptly at 10 o'clock for prayer by the Chaplain, President Walker in the chair. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and, as usual, approved.

President Walker announced that nothing new had transpired relative to the Cabinet dead-lock to his knowledge.

Rep. Smith moved that instead of adjournment the House take a recess until 1:30 p. m. to-day.

Noble Cornwall moved that the House adjourn.

Noble Macfarlane said that he favored a recess as he had heard that Her Majesty had addressed a letter to the chairman of the caucus committee (Noble Young) and if he was here the information contained therein would undoubtedly throw some light on the situation. But as the member was absent it would be advisable, as he thought, to simply take a recess until afternoon when Noble Young would be present. Time would be gained by a recess and he was in favor of that motion.

Rep. White seconded the motion to adjourn.

The President put the question at 10:08 and the motion to adjourn was carried.

THE QUEEN'S HOSPITAL.

Dr. G. P. Andrews Elected Physician vice Dr. McKibbin, Resigned.
 The regular quarterly meeting of this corporation was held this morning at the Chamber of Commerce, Hon. Chas. R. Bishop, vice president, in the chair, and besides whom there were present of the Board of Trustees fourteen members. The minutes of the adjourned meeting of the 22d ult. were read and approved.

The report of Dr. Robert McKibbin, physician of the Hospital, was then read and on motion accepted and ordered printed. The treasurer reported verbally a debt this date to Bishop & Co. of \$—. The report of the visiting committee was presented, accepted and the committee discharged.

The election of a physician was then announced in order. Mr. J. B. Atherton desired to add the name of Dr. G. P. Andrews to the list of nominations made at the last meeting. The secretary by permission read the application of Dr. Andrews for the position of physician, and also the declaration of Dr. F. R. Day, Mr. Cleghorn reported verbally that Dr. G. Trousseau had also declined the nomination. Ballots were then distributed and Mr. Tom May was appointed teller. The result of the ballot elected Dr. G. P. Andrews, physician, and Dr. C. B. Wood, surgeon, to serve until the annual election next June.

Hons. H. A. Widemann, C. P. Tanke and J. B. Atherton were appointed by the chair as a visiting committee for the ensuing quarter. Adjourned.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE QUEEN'S HOSPITAL:

Gentlemen—I have the honor to submit the following report for the quarter ending August 31, 1892: The number of patients at present in the Hospital is 71, viz: 39 Hawaiians (28 males, 11 females), 1 Chinese, 9 Japanese and 22 of other nationalities; 28 paying.

The number of admissions during the quarter was 118, viz: 54 Hawaiians (37 males, 17 females), 5 Chinese, 21 Japanese and 38 of other nationalities.

Discharged, 105, viz: 51 Hawaiians (32 males, 19 females), 5 Chinese, 18 Japanese and 31 of other nationalities.

Deaths, 17; viz: 8 Hawaiians (6 males, 2 females), 2 Chinese, 4 Japanese and 3 of other nationalities.

Of the above one died ten minutes, one forty minutes and four within two days after admission.

The causes of death were: Angina pectoris 1, Bright's Disease 2, Consumption 6, Disease of Bladder 1, Dysentery 1, Hepatitis 1, Meningitis 1, Ovarian Cyst 1, Pleurisy 1, Tetanus 1, Typhoid Fever 1.

The highest number of indoor patients was 79; lowest 58; daily average 66. Calls at the dispensary 122. Number of prescriptions 2594.

The total number of patients treated at the Hospital was as follows: June, 114; July, 103; August, 105. Respectfully submitted,
