Friday, March 17, Kamehameha III. day, is proclaimed as a public holiday.

The dredger has cleared quite a space of ground near the Pacific Mail dock.

Seven passengers left by the steamer W. G. Hall this morning for the Volcano.

The Civil Rights League will hold a meeting this evening at Arion hall at 7:30 o'clock.

Two Government lots on the Esplanade will be sold at the Government Building April 12.

It is reported that the Japanese training ship Kon-go will leave for Japan on Thursday next.

Three Chinese opium fiends were sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 each in the District Court this morning.

Twelve opium smokers were arrested last night, Marshal W. G. Ashley capturing some of them himself.

A pocket book containing considerable wealth has been lost, and a reward of \$50 is offered for its return.

There will be a sale of government land at Kalihi, at the front entrance of Alioli Hale, to-morrow, at noon.

There will be an adjourned meeting of the old volunteer Hook & Ladder Co. at Fire Police hall to-morrow evening.

Five thousand boxes of tea from China were stopped by the Customs authorities of Melbourne recently as being unfit for human consumption.

H. B. M. S. Garnet sailed out to harbor promptly at noon to-day on her way to Esquimaux. It is expected that she will return at a future date.

"Thumbs Up and Thumbs Down" will be the topic of Dr. Lucas at the Y. M. C. A. hall this evening. The lecturer has high testimonials from the United States, England, Canada and Australia.

Ka Maile store has received some elegant new dress goods. They are being arranged to-day for a grand opening to-morrow. The exhibit will be worth seeing, and the ladies will not miss it.

The independent Hawaiian Band began practice at the residence of William Aylett yesterday morning. The instruments are new and the music is new, and the boys expect to give a concert in about a week.

A party was given last night by the Myrtle Boat Club at its house in honor of Captain Thornton of the British schooner Tacora. There were about 35 present, including members. Refreshments were served and dancing was kept up till 11:30. All had a delightful time.

At the meeting of the Scottish Thistle Club last night Clausman Robert Laing read an original poem descriptive of the club's celebration of Burns night. It was so well appreciated that the club at once voted the author to be poet laureate of the club.

Sam Pedro, for using threatening language against his wife, was ordered by Police Magistrate Foster this morning to file a bond of \$100 to keep the peace for one year. A native was also ordered to file a similar bond to keep the peace with his wife for six months.

A report of the military committee, now under reference to the Executive Council, recommends an increase of the regular force to 103, being 18 more than present strength. The Provisional Legislature has appropriated \$350 to provide further accommodations for the band, battery company and drill shed.

The funeral of the late Edwin J. Jeffery, staff engineer of the Garnet, yesterday afternoon was one of the most imposing ever witnessed in Honolulu. The military display of the men-of-war-men was very impressive. Major J. H. Wodehouse and Captain H. T. Hughes-Hallett were the chief mourners.

In the window of Mr. Kruger, watchmaker, Cummins block, is exhibited the champion six-oared silver cup won by the Healaui Boat Club. It is a massive work. The cup is supported by six oars, each bearing the name of one of the champion crew. "Carl W." is the boat's name, after Carl Widemann, president of the club, is on the base.

Two women had a fight at the "bluegate" resort on Merchant street this afternoon in which one was scratched about the face. The fracas was bordering on a general row when Captain Fehlbahr arrived and had both women escorted to the Police Station. The wounded woman was locked up, and the other allowed her liberty. The trouble was caused by jealousy.

Opera House.

A round of entertainments is in rehearsal for production at the Opera House commencing on Saturday, the 25th inst. Mr. Crowley has planned a varied series of productions in the line of comedy, minstrelsy and variety together with the Hawaiian historical drama entitled "Oceanica," for which new scenery has been painted.

Steamer Fireman Killed.

One of the firemen of the Japanese steamer Milke Maru fell into the forehold last night. He died on board three hours after the accident. His funeral took place this afternoon.

WHY HE WAS REMOVED.

Correspondence Between Minister Macfarlane and Assessor Brown.

What About the People's Side Getting a Hearing?

It is fresh in the public mind that in the short tenure of the Macfarlane Ministry the Tax Assessor and Collector for the Island of Oahu, Mr. C. A. Brown, was dismissed from office by the Minister of Finance, Hon. E. C. Macfarlane. Also, that Mr. Brown resisted his dismissal by certain legal processes, which culminated in his getting a judgment in his favor from Judge Frear. This judgment held that Mr. Brown was not lawfully dismissed because he had not been accorded a hearing on the charges against him. An appeal was taken from the decision of Judge Frear, but at that moment Mr. C. N. Spencer, whom Mr. Macfarlane had appointed to the office and against whom Mr. Brown's suit was directed, suddenly died.

Mr. Brown seized the opportunity and took possession of the Tax Office with the consent of Hon. P. C. Jones, Minister of Finance in the Provisional Government. His only legal claim lay in the decision of the Circuit Court Judge, from which an appeal had been taken as stated. The lapse of this appeal through the death of the appellant left the issue that was of public importance in an unsettled state judicially. Mr. Macfarlane had given reasons according to the statute for his dismissal of the Tax Assessor, a subordinate in his Department. If those reasons were capable of proof, and there exists sworn testimony of their truth, then the taxpayers of Oahu are insulted and outraged by having such a man as C. A. Brown in occupancy of the position of Tax Assessor and Collector. If Mr. Brown was entitled to a hearing to save the office and its emoluments to him, then the public ought to have much greater rights of a hearing in behalf of their interests.

Some of the alleged offenses of Mr. Brown while holding the office were notorious. They were committed shamelessly in full public view. His holding of a miserable specimen of a legislator in virtual custody, dragging him in a debauched state between the legislative chamber and his house, was one of the most conspicuous incidents of the attempt to put out the Macfarlane Ministry which succeeded. The sworn proofs of other dishonorable doings of this salaried public officer are available for publication. In the meantime the public may take the reasons as given for Mr. Brown's dismissal, and judge whether in the case of their truth such a man is fit to hold any public trust. The most essential parts of the correspondence between the Minister and the Assessor are given below:

Sir:—I am in receipt of your letter of October 17th, stating that in furtherance of public interests and for reasons which Her Majesty's Cabinet deem sufficient, you notify me of my removal from the office of Assessor of the Island of Oahu, and demanding that I deliver the records of my office to Mr. T. A. Lloyd, the Deputy Assessor and Collector for the District.

In reply allow me to state that I am advised that no legal case is stated for my removal, and as none exists I decline to comply with your request. I remain, Sir,

Sir:—Your refusal to vacate the office of Assessor of the Island of Oahu, cannot in anyway be recognized in law. The statute provides that, after such removal and within fourteen days, you shall be furnished with specifications of the grounds upon which the removal was made.

In compliance with the statute, I will call your attention to the following reasons, which are deemed ample grounds for your removal by Her Majesty's Cabinet, viz:—

1st.—That by unlawfully and illegally using your power as Assessor of the Island of Oahu, you did hinder and prevent your deputy S. Hockano, Deputy Assessor and Collector for the district of Ewa and Waianae, from collecting the sum of \$745, taxes due in 1891 upon the property of your wife, Mrs. Brown, situate in said district.

2nd.—That on the evening of the 14th day of September, 1892, while the resolution of want of confidence in myself and my colleagues was under discussion in the Legislature, you did wilfully, feloniously, illegally and corruptly approach Hon. Joseph Nawahi, Representative from Hilo, who was opposed to said resolution, and then and there did corruptly offer said Hon. Joseph Nawahi a certain piece of land in Hilo, if the said Nawahi would vote in favor

of the said resolution of want of confidence and against the Cabinet.
3rd.—That you unlawfully and corruptly, and in abuse of the power of your said office did force and compel Mr. T. A. Lloyd, Deputy Assessor for Honolulu, an appointee under you, to pay over and give to you a part of the legal compensation and emoluments of the office of him, said Lloyd, for your personal use and benefit.

4th.—That while in the occupancy of the office of Assessor in Chief of the Island of Oahu, you have been offensively partisan, using your official influence to bring about a want of confidence in the Ministry; that your course has been one that tends to the demoralization of the civil service; that you have also spoken contemptuously of Her Majesty's Ministers to other employees of the Government, which conduct cannot but help to subvert the discipline and respect which subordinate officers should have for their superiors in office. Your conduct has generally been such as must tend to corrupt the public service. Yours, etc.,

Sir:—Your letter of the 18th inst. was received by me after business hours of that day.

The alleged reasons for your action in my case as far as they concern my official conduct in the discharge of my duties as Assessor for the Island of Oahu or impute dishonest or improper action of any kind are false in fact and can easily be shown to be without foundation. I still decline to recognize your action in removing me as legal; as it was taken without charges preferred and without opportunity given me to confront my accuser or to be heard.

So far as my course in politics is concerned I deny that it can be made a cause for my removal. The tenure of my office is established by the Act relating to it. Removal for political reasons is not authorized. Moreover, I know of no obligation which should make my course in politics agreeable to you. If offense has been so in instance of rights inherent in citizenship, and which were not lost on my taking office nor upon your formation of a Ministry.

FLOOD AT EWA.

Railway Traffic Checked—Loss of a Town Horse and Hack.

The streams at Ewa are reported to have swollen considerably within the past twenty-four hours, so much so that the railway trains were unable to go beyond Waikole to-day, but had to turn back. At noon to-day there was a heavy fresh running down to the sea.

Yesterday morning a Portuguese hack-driver named Manuel Cabralho took some passengers whalers down to Waialua, where they were to spend a few days. Cabralho stayed till late in the afternoon, when he started to return to the city. The current of the Halawa stream was pretty strong when he came to the brink, but he nevertheless attempted to cross it in his hack. Just as the horse had gained the middle a heavy torrent of water swept the horse's legs from under him and the whole outfit was carried down the stream. Cabralho jumped out and grabbed the bank, but the horse was drowned and the vehicle smashed to pieces. The driver returned to town at noon to-day with one cushion, the sole-ride of his hack-driving outfit. He offered a reward for the recovery of the horse, but the body could not be found.
