

Most of the space in this issue is given up to Mr. Nordhoff's second letter to the New York Herald. It relentlessly exposes facts of the situation which other visiting correspondents of the American press have either suppressed or had suppressed by their chiefs at home.

Mr. Chas. L. Carter's scheme to drain some of the obnoxious surplus colored element from the Southern States to Hawaii is ridiculed by the New Orleans (Louisiana) Delta. It says the suggestion that this plan is to be adopted in order to cultivate a sentiment in the South favorable to annexation is too flimsy for argument.

In this issue will be found the letter from Mr. Thurston to Mr. Colburn, the gist of which was given in the BULLETIN the day the letter arrived. It has been awaiting the receiver's permission to publish it ever since, but in the meantime a friend in the States to whom he sent a copy has given it to the press.

Late American papers discuss a proposition for the abolition of the sugar bounty without the intervention of Congress. It is simply for the Secretary of the Treasury to issue an order to his subordinates to draw no more warrants and make no more payments on account of sugar bounties. This action, it is assumed, would get the matter into the courts and secure from the Supreme Court an early decision of the question whether Congress has power under the Constitution to pay gratuities to private individuals out of money taken from the people by taxation.

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

Diamond Head, 3 p. m.—Weather, hazy; wind fresh east.

Two more "hitting-the-pipe" fends—Chinese—were arrested early this morning.

Work on the city front road from the Claudine wharf to the Inter-Island office is about completed.

It is raining pretty heavily out Palama and up the valley, but at Waikiki there is scarcely any rain at all.

Geo. E. Boardman, Real Estate Broker, has added a house on Beretania street to his list of properties for sale.

There will be a concert by the Government band at the Hotel this evening. The five new men from Frisco will take part.

The men of war vessels in port are trying to arrange to have boat races in the harbor on the 24th inst., Queen Victoria's birthday.

Two cases of German measles have been discovered among the national guards at the barracks. The men have been segregated.

There will be a tug-of-war match between Kapukukolo and Panoa teams below the Fishmarket at 5:30 o'clock this evening, for fifty dollars a side.

A large halo around the sun attracted the attention of many people this forenoon. One gentleman on seeing it sang out, "kahunas are at work."

Mr. J. E. Bush, editor of the Ka Leo, was committed for trial to the Circuit Court in the District Court this morning on a charge of libel against the P. G.

The Healanu Boat Club will meet this evening to appoint delegates to consult with the Myrtle representatives with regard to the coming championship race.

The smuggling schooner Louis Olson has been confiscated by the U. S. Government. The schooner will be sold and the proceeds turned into the United States treasury.

The annual meeting of the Woman's Board of Missions will be held in the Central Union Church on Friday morning at 10 o'clock. A general invitation is issued to all women interested in mission work.

The program for the benefit to the Hawaiian National Band appears in to-day's issue. The concert will take place in the Opera House on Saturday evening, when it is expected a bumper house will greet the boys.

The Springfield Republican of April 28 contains the report of a lecture in that city by Miss Anna L. Dawes on "The United States and Hawaii," favoring annexation; also a letter from Rev. Dr. Hyde of Honolulu in advocacy of the same cause.

Marshal Hitchcock has issued new regulations to the police pertaining to their dress, appearance and deportment, when on duty. No officer is allowed to smoke except between 7 o'clock in the evening and 5:30 o'clock in the morning. The rules will be strictly enforced.

The Sons of St. George intend to celebrate Queen Victoria's birthday this year by giving one of their enjoyable social dances, supplemented by an oyster supper, in their hall on Fort street. In order to avoid disappointment, tickets should be secured right away at the Golden Rule Bazaar, as the number to be issued is strictly limited to 70.

Mr. W. R. Castle on Tuesday evening addressed a medium-sized audience in Y. M. C. A. hall, giving a familiar talk on the experiences of the Annexation Commissioners in the United States. A collection at the door was for the benefit of the W. C. T. U., whose President, Mrs. J. M. Whitney, introduced the speaker. The lecture was pleasing to the auditors generally.

The horticulturist and gentleman farmer have been yearning for something to fill this large aching void in this respect and their wants are now satisfied. Heretofore one could never feel sure when they planted a package of lima beans whether beans or wild parsnips would be the result. He can now plant the seed of the Morning Glory and the Moon flower and have the front of his house look like a florist's advertisement in the Century Magazine; no more danger of a bunch of Norway oats and a hill of corn trying to climb the strings nailed up for non-resident vines. The Commissioner of Agriculture will see to these things even though he neglect to tell you that the ingredients for an insecticide strong enough to rid the country of the McKinley blight can be obtained from us.
