LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

Mr. F. Myers has good pasture at Kalihi. Good square meals for 15 cents is what Sonora & Co. offer.

The P. G. Councils will meet at 1:30 o'clock to-morrow afternoon. The Board of Health is holding its usual weekly meeting this afternoon.

Rev. Messrs. Lewis and Callendar returned from Maui by the steamer W. G. Hall.

The Beaver supplied its numerous patrons this noon with delicious chicken curry and rice.

The King street merry-go-round will be sold at auction by J. F. Morgan at noon to-morrow.

The Hook & Ladder Co. expect to have another "divy" on Saturday evening or early next week.

The P. G. band gave its usual weekly concert on the Executive building grounds this morning.

A gasoline launch, about 35 feet long, came by the bark Albert this afternoon for Mr. Gay of Kauai.

Mr. G. Tyrol has been appointed first officer on the yacht Tolna. It is not yet known when she will sail for Hilo.

A full outfit of household furniture was brought to the Police station this afternoon, under distraint for rent.

Arrangements for receiving the Australian team are being promoted by the executive of the Honolulu Cricket Club.

The Advertiser has "news" this morning about scarlet fever at Hilo which appeared in the BULLETIN several days ago.

Mr. W. E. Rowell, Superintendent of Public Works, succeeded in blasting a large hole into the coral near the Miowera yesterday.

Captain W. Matson, part owner in the Hilo packet line, and Mrs. Matson, left on the steamer Claudine yesterday evening for Hilo.

The quarterly meeting of the Straughters' Friend Society will be held at the Y. M. C. A. parlors to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

The Count and Countess Festetics have not decided whether to leave to-morrow or next day for their proposed trip to Hilo and the Volcano.

A photograph of the silver service presented to ex-Minister Stevens by residents of the Hawaiian Islands is on exhibition in Melmer's store window.

The tug Eleu towed the pile-driver out to the wreck this morning. On account of the muddy state of the water the pile-driver was not put to work to-day.

The P. M. S. S. wharf was crowded to-day with heaps of boxes containing merchandise left by the S. S. China. Among the lot were different varieties of tea.

A couple seated on the veranda of a private residence in town were blinded for several minutes by a lightning flash yesterday evening during the storm.

A thunderstorm passed over Honolulu early last night. Frequently the thunder followed vivid flashes of lightning so quickly as to indicate close discharges. Rain fell heavily.

O. Schussler was found guilty of assault and battery on Longheimer, in the District Court to-day, and sentenced to pay a fine of \$10, and to file a bond of \$100 to keep the peace for six months.

The S. S. Alameda will be due from the Colonies en route to San Francisco on Thursday next. The S. S. Monowai and S. S. Warrimoo will be due here from San Francisco and Vancouver, B. C., on the 23d instant.

The arrangements for a football match between the Pacifics and Punahou to take place on the 30th inst., Thanksgiving Day, have progressed so favorably that a match is as good as assured. Both teams are hard at practice.

The Myrtle boat club will hold its regular monthly meeting at the bathhouse this evening, when it is expected the challenge of the Healanis will be considered. The foul in the late race between "green-hand" crews will also be discussed.

With the November number of the Anglican Church Chronicle, that interesting periodical ends its eleventh volume. Its editor (Rev. A. Mackintosh) is pleased with the support it has received. The Chronicle deserves all the patronage it enjoys.

The fall of rain at the Electric Light Station, Nuuanu Valley, last night was 2.01 inches. The different reservoirs have been materially replenished and this morning showed the following supply: In No. 1, 8 ft. 6 in. of water; in No. 2, 8 ft. 1 in. No. 3, 6 ft. 7 in.

Another issue of the Paradise of the Pacific is out. It contains a number of articles of information regarding its patronage, and a short sketch by Miss Touria Henry of Honolulu, on "Te Umi Ti, a Raitaean Ceremony." There is a lifelike portrait of Mr. Cecil Brown, ex-Attorney-General, accompanied by a brief biography of that gentleman.

Ah Tong alias Thon Choy, the Chinese merchant who was captured by officer Stone on the Pacific Mail wharf after coming off the S. S. Oceanic, with four tins of opium between his legs, appeared in the District Court this morning. The charge of smuggling was not proved and opium in possession substituted. The merchant pleaded guilty and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$250.

IN HIS OWN COUNTRY.

Monument to Father Damien Projected in Belgium.

Mons. H. Jaltray, Consul for Colombia at Brussels, Belgium, in a letter to Mr. Frank Godfrey, editor Paradise of the Pacific, gives the following information about a monument to be erected to Father Damien in his native country:

"Referring to the dedication of the Father Damien memorial cross which took place last month at Molokai, it might perhaps interest you to know that a monument to the martyr priest of Molokai is also to be erected at Louvain, Belgium. The monument representing the apostle of lepers in the exercise of his apostleship is due to the chisel of a Belgian sculptor of renown, Mr. Constantine Meunier, and will be, they say, very successful. The city of Louvain has been chosen, because it is in a neighboring village, at Tremeloo, where Father Damien was born. The necessary funds for the erection of the monument have been collected among the numerous admirers of Father Damien, and the enthusiasm for this work was so great at Louvain that the subscription list hardly came beyond this university town. The committee is composed of a number of notabilities of the town, among whom are several university professors. They have at their head Chevalier Edward Dancamps, professor of law, member of the Senate, who lately distinguished himself in a brilliant manner as first prizeman of the competition opened at Paris for the best poem against slavery, and for the preponderant part that he took in the debates of the Senate on the important question of the constitutional revision in Belgium. The Belgian Government subscribed for an important sum to the monument, and the committee has invited the Hawaiian Government to be represented at the ceremony."

AN ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE. Determined Efforts of a Chinaman to Drown Himself.

Harbor policeman Patterson was standing near the boat landing, leaning over the davit of the pilot boat, when he noticed a Chinaman, standing at the corner of the wharf, a few feet from him. While watching the Chinaman he saw him jump into the water head first, and lie still with his face downwards, not even floundering. Patterson jumped into a boat and grabbed the Chinaman's blouse, when the desperate fellow made an effort to dive, and the officer came near losing his hold. He managed, however, to pull up the man, dripping wet, out of the water into the boat and thence to the wharf. The Chinaman was taken to the Police station, where he gave the name of Wong See. He had been a laborer at Kula, Maui, and had come to town to look for work. Failing to secure work and having no money, he decided to go and drown himself. Wong See was divested of his wet clothing, and after being wrapped up in a blanket was put in a cell. It is believed that the Chinaman is slightly deranged.

A cousin of Wong See called at the station shortly after noon, and told the authorities that the man's mind was wandering. He would take him to his own house and care for him until the next steamer for China, when he would secure a passage.

ROBBERY OF A SERVANT. Room of a Japanese Domestic Entered and Pillaged.

A Japanese in the employ of Mrs. J. S. Walker, Nuuanu Valley, reported to the Police Station at 9:30 o'clock yesterday evening that his apartments on the Walker premises had been entered during the early part of the evening, and a gold watch valued at \$150 and \$15.50 in silver taken. The Jap, who lives in a detached building, had been busy attending to his duties about his employer's house the early part of the evening, and on returning found his apartment not as cosy or neat-looking as customary. The window was open and there was a streak of blood on the sill. Pursuing investigation he found his trunk had been opened and the aforementioned property stolen. The burglar whoever he was had probably cut his hand in going out of the window, presuming in a hurry. The Jap suspects someone of his professed friends of the burglary.

DANGEROUS NIGHT PROWLER. Man from the Adams Assaults a Native With a Knife.

The premises of a native named Kaniela, who resides above the Queen's Hospital, on the Punchbowl slopes, was entered by a petty officer belonging to the U. S. S. Adams about 10:30 o'clock last night during the heavy thunderstorm. Kaniela ordered the man off the premises, when the latter struck him with a knife, luckily without serious injury. The knife plowed across the forehead skin deep. A telephone message to the station brought two officers, but the man had escaped in the darkness. Kaniela stated to the officers that the intruder is a petty officer on the U. S. S. Adams and gave his name as Nilson.
