**SOME LARGE STEAMERS.**

Interesting Comparisons for the Curious on Pacific Liners.

The San Francisco Chronicle has the following in its marine news. It may settle discussions such as often arise on the wharf when a big steamer is docking at Honolulu:

The Australian steamer Arawa is due to-day from Australia by way of Samoa and Honolulu. She will go alongside at the Oceanic dock and will completely fill the south side of the wharf, and a large portion of her, forward, will extend out into East street. For net tonnage she is the largest steamer that ever entered port except the Silvertown, which was here about ten or twelve years ago. Her gross tonnage is 5026, while that of the Silvertown was but 4935. Her tonnage below decks is 4131, and net tonnage 3298. The Silvertown was 4913 below decks and 3724 net. The Arawa is 439.6 feet long, 46.3 feet in breadth of beam and 28.9 feet in depth of hold. The entire length of the Oceanic dock is 660 feet, but that part covered by the shed, from the east side at East street to the end of the wharf, is only 430 feet. The Arawa was built in 1884 at Dumbarton by W. Denny & Brothers. She has been put on the Australian route in place of the Monowai, which has taken the run of the lost Wairarapa.

The Pacific Mail steamer China is nearly one foot longer than the Arawa, her dimensions being: Length, 440.4 feet; breadth of beam, 48.1 feet, and depth of hold, 32.8 feet. The China's gross tonnage is 4940, and her net tonnage only 2401. The heaviest tonnage steamer sailing into port is the City of Peking, due from the Orient on Saturday. She is 5080 tons gross and 3129 net. Her length is 423 feet; breadth of beam, 48 feet, and depth of hold, 27.8 feet. As the two big vessels will be in port together an excellent opportunity will be given for comparison.

**A JUROR GETS WEARY.**

The Court Asked to Shorten the Trial of Railroad Strikers.

The monotony of the trial of railroad strikers, which has been going on in the United States District Court for several weeks, was relieved somewhat by the action of one of the jurors. When court opened yesterday one of the jurors arose from his seat in the jury box and complained to the Court that Attorney Montieth, who represents the defense, was protracting the trial by the unnecessary questions he asked the witnesses. The juror said he for one was tired of the manner in which the case was being prolonged. Montieth at once objected to the statement made by the juror, and began a speech, which Judge Morrow interrupted. Judge Morrow said that the manner of conducting the case was within the discretion of the Court, and that every facility must be given to the attorneys in the examination of witnesses. He further stated that an effort would be made to curtail the trial as much as possible in view of the importance of the case.

Attorney Montieth said that he considered the conduct of the juror very improper. He had no assistance in the trial, and he objected to being charged with unnecessarily taking up the time of the Court. He also said that if his conduct in the case was not deemed correct he would withdraw altogether, as he did not want to do anything that is detrimental to his clients.

Judge Morrow, after admonishing the attorney to be careful not to ask unnecessary questions in his cross-examinations, ordered the trial to proceed. The witnesses examined yesterday gave an account of the acts committed by the strikers at the Oakland mole.—S. F. Chronicle.

**Valuable Find Near Pompeii.**

A valuable discovery has been made at Pianella-Setteimini, near Pompeii, on the property of a certain Vincent de Proseo. A house has been unearthed which was covered at the time the city was buried, and it is said to be in a more perfect condition than any building yet discovered. It contains several large apartments, and three bathrooms with the basins in sculptured marble, and with leaden pipes ornamented with bronze faucets. The three rooms correspond, says a writer in describing the discovery, to the "calidarium, tepidarium, and frigidarium which were always to be found in ancient houses of the first class. In consequence of the eruption of Vesuvius in A. D. 79, the Pompeian houses heretofore brought to light have been roofless, almost without exception. Fortunately that on the property of M. de Proseo is perfect, and archaeologists are happy over that fact. The roof measures almost forty-four feet in length."
