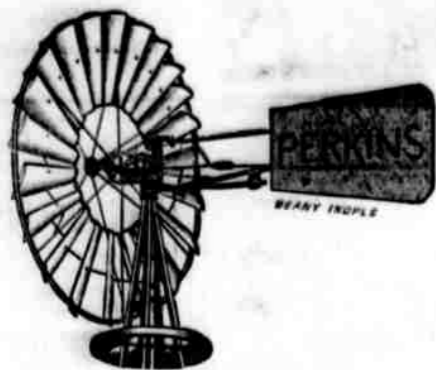


The Perkins Windmill

FOREIGN NOTES.

Young Dole Keeps Up His Athletic Fame.

Snow fell at Marquette, Michigan, for half an hour on June 4. Richard M. Scroggs, a millionaire, is held by the grand jury in New York for smuggling jewelry.

Three men are in jail for counterfeiting at San Francisco. Bogus five-dollar pieces were found in their possession.

President McKinley has expressed his regrets that he cannot accept the invitation of San Francisco to visit the Coast this summer.

C. L. Dole of Stanford, nephew of President Dole, won first in running broad jump, 21 feet 3 1/2 inches, and in pole vault, 10 feet 4 1/2 inches, at the intercollegiate athletic contests in Chicago.

Admiral Palliser at Victoria has received word from the Admiralty Office that the sealing schooner Beatrice, Captain Oleson, will be allowed compensation for seizure in Behring sea by the United States steamer Rush in 1895.

The schooner Volante was chartered at San Francisco lately for a trip to Siberia, where she was to take aboard a load of reindeer for Alaska, but she was prevented from clearing through the refusal of the Russian Consul to sign the clearance papers. The excuse given was that the schooner had several missionaries on board, and that the Russian Government wanted no missionaries to take up their abodes among the Siberian natives.

Rev. W. D. Williams has brought a hornet's nest about his ears by putting part of a poem by Whittier over his signature in the Pacific. Editor Cruzan demanded an explanation when the plagiarism was pointed out to him. Mr. Williams said in reply that he had copied the verses from an old clipping in a notebook, sending them to the Congregational paper along with an obituary notice. As he was on the eve of leaving for New York, to enter the Episcopal church, his "mistake" is deemed peculiarly unfortunate.

The last hour of the session of the Illinois Legislature on June 5 was a rough-and-tumble farce. The Chamber of Representatives was in an uproar. Paper balls, pasteboard boxes, books and even market baskets were used at the game of pitch-and-toss. Votes on many bills were recorded, and nobody but the clerk knew how they were recorded. Bills were passed, and nobody but the Speaker and the clerk knew the bills by number, to say nothing of the titles. The Senate was equally disorderly, and personal encounters were narrowly averted in many instances.

At Pullman, Washington, about 11 o'clock the night of June 5, a dynamite bomb was placed at the door of Professor S. H. Webster's room in the boys' dormitory at the Washington Agricultural College and School of Science and exploded. The explosion occurred in the hallway on the first floor, and sounded like a cannon. Seven transoms and sixteen windows were broken and the door of the room, partition, walls, ceilings and floors of the first and second floors of the building were badly shattered. Lamps were broken and general havoc created. A suspected student was expelled next day, but he hired a lawyer to fight the accusation.
