The method is not fully determined, but it is regarded as probable that Hawaii will be a part of the United States within a year. The formalities can hardly be completed before.

WATERFRONT ITEMS

STEAMER KINAU FOR MAUI AND HAWAII DEPARTS.

A Ship Passes By in the Morning—Other Notes of the Harbor Front—Passengers.

Marines from the U S war vessels were ashore for drill this forenoon.

Tomorrow, high tide large 7:00 p m; high tide small 8:00 a m; low tide large 2:10 a m; low tide small; 0:15 p m.

A strange ship was sighted off port early this morning. It was thought at first to be the ship Roanoke, but the stranger sailed right by.

Shortly before seven o'clock this morning, the Inter-Island S N Co's pile of Westport coal was found to be afire. A fire engine was sent for, which soon put out the fire with water from the bay.

The American ship Mary L Cushing is to come here to load sugar for New York, from Japan. The ship Commodore will come from San Francisco, also to load for "round the Horn." The Commodore was here last year.

The British ship Eurydice, Captain J F Curtis, arrived at Port Townsend May 24, from Hongkong, after what is said to be the fastest voyage ever made by a sailing vessel across the Pacific. The Eurydice made the passage from Mella Heads, which is at the entrance to Yokohama harbor, to Port Townsend bay, in nineteen days. The time of the Eurydice from the China Heads was but twenty-three days. On May 14, the ship reeled off 320 miles in twenty-four hours.—S F Com News.

The Aorangi Reaches Victoria.

Victoria, B. C., June 7.—The steamship Aorangi, the third addition to the Canadian-Australian line, reached port early this morning under difficulties. It left Sydney on the 10th of May, but the machinery broke down several times and stoppages delayed the vessel three days in reaching Honolulu. The same trouble was experienced afterward, and three days more were added to the passage. Two very large guns for Esquimalt defenses arrived on the steamship.
