TO SAVE LIFE AT SEA

San Jose, Oct. 4.—A San Jose man has won the Pollock award of \$20,000 for the best device for saving life at sea. The money was set aside by the heirs of Edward Pollock, who perished with his wife on the steamer Bourgogne of the French line last year, and the lucky man is Z. C. Angevine of this city, who was formerly the manager of Pohlheim's tailoring establishment here. In addition to winning the Pollock award, Angevine's device will probably be adopted by the United States Government for the use of the life-saving service.

The Angevine device uses air for buoyancy. In appearance it closely resembles a waistcoat with buttons. Down each side of the back in the place occupied by the seams in a woman's dress are two slender rubber bags. They are furnished with valves and can be inflated with air either by an ordinary bicycle pump or by the mouth. At the front are too much larger air bags, about the size and shape of a man's vest. These are also furnished with valves and can be inflated at pleasure.

There are thus four separated air compartments as a base of operations. When attached to a swimmer it is impossible for him to sink. In the experiments just made two men took heavy rifles into the water with them and were able to stand upright and shoot at a mark.

The inventor says he has sometimes rigged a sail to himself in the water and made good headway. He says that in use the coats could be hung already inflated by the side of the passengers' berths on the steamer. While he considers rubber the most desirable material for the air chambers, thin sheet copper or aluminum could be employed. Angevine is now in Washington awaiting the pleasure of the Life-Saving Department.

PRINCESS KAULANI'S BIRTHDAY.

Yesterday afternoon exercises were given by the pupils of the new Princess Kaiulani School, Palms suburb, in honor of the birthday of the late Princess, which occurs on Monday, the 16th and on which day the school will remain closed. There were many visitors to listen to the entertaining program of fourteen numbers the last of which was the following song composed in honor of Princess Kaiulani's birthday, and sung in chorus to the tune of Hawaii Pono:

With voices sweet and clear,
