REPUBLICANS SWEEP OHIO

Cincinnati, Nov. 8.—Unofficial returns have been received by the Western Union Telegraph Company from all counties in Ohio, with a few scattering precincts estimated. The footings give Nash (R.) for Governor a plurality of 49,205.

Cincinnati, Nov. 8.—Nash has 84,399 over McLean, and in thirty-one counties McLean has 34,635 over Nash. This gives Nash over McLean in the State 69,354. It is not believed the official returns will make any important changes in the figures. No figures are available on the total vote in the State as the committee sought to obtain only pluralities. Notwithstanding efforts were made to get the vote for Jones, returns have been secured from only forty of the eighty-eight counties. These include the counties in which the heaviest Jones vote was polled and show a total of 84,000. The remaining counties will swell the Jones vote to 100,000.

The Republican figures on the Legislature are: Republicans 61, Democrats 45, doubtful 3. Senate—Republicans 18, Democrats 1, doubtful 2.

KENTUCKY CLAIMED BY ALL. Louisville, Ky., Nov. 9.—10 a. m.—As the returns and corrected reports from the belated counties come in the situation in Kentucky is unchanged. Both Democrats and Republicans are claiming the election this morning, the former by a plurality of 3000 and the Republicans by 7000. Charges of attempted fraud are being made by both parties, and especially so at the Republican headquarters in this city. Senator Debee and several prominent Republicans were at the headquarters at an early hour this morning. They have received returns from every county in the State and say Taylor's majority will not fall below 5000 and from later reports they have had, unofficial figures increase Taylor's majority.

BELL'S STEADY ADVANCE. New York, Nov. 8.—A Sun cable from Manila says: Colonel Bell's advance yesterday resulted in the occupation of Malabacat without casualties on the American side. MacArthur's orders to Colonel Bell were that he should proceed from Porco over a circuitous mountain road, well to the west of the railroad and explore the country. Bell's instructions were to push his reconnaissance until he came in contact with the enemy. Bell's forces reached Malabacat in the evening. There was an insurgent garrison of 200 men at this place, but the rebels fled after a short resistance. Several Filipino officers were killed and a few prisoners taken. Bell reported to MacArthur at midnight. The General immediately ordered the troops so arranged that the rebels who were in front of Angeles would be surrounded.

FUSIONISTS WIN NEBRASKA. Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 8.—Complete returns coming in tonight, do not materially change the early estimates of the results of yesterday's election. The Fusionists carry the State by 12,000, perhaps more, on the face of returns from nearly half the counties. The Democrats swept Maryland and Mississippi. The Republicans carried New Jersey, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and Iowa.
