BOER WAR PHOTOGRAPHS.

The demand for photographs of Boer war scenes for publication has so far outrun the supply that ingenious Frenchmen have devised a scheme by which any style of war pictures may be made to order on short notice. The French photographers have secured some old horses, a few guns, and a score or more of supers from one of the Paris theaters. The supers who are photographed as Boers may be distinguished by their long whiskers, and the Englishmen may be known at a glance by their uniforms. Near Paris imitation breastworks have been constructed and these are stormed several times a day by the supers while the camera man takes their picture. When a general officer is wounded the scene is produced by the aid of an old horse and a super who is photographed in the act of falling out of the saddle. Such little odds and ends of war as photographs of snipers, pickets, stretcher bearers, etc., are easily counterfeited before the camera, and the results are just as good for the purposes of the papers which buy them as would be photographs from the battlefield. There is one genuine picture of a ford somewhere in South Africa which has done service every time a river has been crossed. It is a peaceful looking picture with a big tree at the left in the foreground, a shallow river behind it, and half a dozen cows or sheep wading to the further shore. Whenever any division of the English army has crossed a river anywhere this picture has been trotted out to illustrate the exact place of crossing. If the English forces keep on maneuvering as they have in the past two months they may cross this particular river at this very ford. Along with the mass of counterfeit pictures which are sold in this country are many genuine ones. None of the genuine photographs up to date, however, have been half so dramatic as the counterfeits.—New York Sun.

One Man's Work.

There is a man named Alexis E. Frye in Cuba. He has gone thither at his own expense to help in preparing the Cubans for that independence and self-government which the United States has promised them. Four months ago he found 4,000 Cuban children going to public schools of an inferior sort. He has now 80,000 Cuban children attending public schools of a superior sort, and expects that their numbers will be increased to 150,000 by next June.

Under pressure he has consented to receive a salary, but he gives every cent of it to Cuban charities. He is an enlightened educator, an enthusiast for that education that fits men for free citizenship, and his work is directed with an eye single to that end. He drew the public school law for Cuba, and he is administering it in a way that will serve the republic's best interests, if Cuba shall ever become a State in the Union, and serve Cuba's best interests if that island will take her place among the independent nations of the earth.

Here is a concrete example of how our "larger duties" ought to be discharged.—New York World.

Flying Fox Sold.

London, March 8.—At the sale today of the late Duke of Westminster's string of race horses at King'sclere, England, Flying Fox, the winner in 1899 of the Derby, the Two Thousand Guineas, the Eclipse stakes and the Doncaster St. Leger, was purchased by Edmond Blanc for 37,500 guineas. Blanc is the son of the founder of Monte Carlo and brother-in-law of Roland Bonaparte. His competitor in the bidding for Flying Fox was a man named Gilpen, who was bidding for an American, probably William C. Whitney. Other good prices were 2,000 guineas for Goo Luck and 5,000 for Goblet; Manchuria, 4,300 guineas; Calueley, 7,900 guineas.

To Educate Japanese.

Stanford University, March 6.—J. F. Abbott, '99, has been appointed professor of English in Shinga Nikka Nigaku, the Prefectural College of Omi, an institution located at Otsu, Japan, which is similar to the State universities in the United States. He is planning to be absent at least one year. The position which he goes to accept is at present held by Spooner, '98, who has been given a position in the school of foreign languages at Tokio. Abbott graduated from the department of zoology, and has been for the past year an assistant in the university library.

Paris, March 8.—The famous Theater Francais has been destroyed by fire. The Theater Francais of Comedie Francaise was situated on the Place du Theater Francais, near the Palais Royal, and occupied the highest rank among the theaters of France. It was built in 1872, but was much altered in later years. It contained many magnificent specimens of art in sculpture, relief and painting.
