GIFT TO COL. RUHLEN

A committee of business men of Honolulu has presented Col. George Ruhlen, Major and Quartermaster U. S. Army, with a Swiss gold watch in appreciation of his conduct, personal and official, toward the donors during his incumbency here now drawing to a close. In his reply to an address accompanying the gift Col. Ruhlen says: "In the discharge of my public duties during the past two years that I have been stationed here it has been my aim to secure to the best of my ability the interests of the United States Government, whose agent I am. Among the duties devolving upon me has been the disbursement for purchase of supplies and employment of services of more than seven hundred thousand dollars of government funds, for all of which my employer has, I sincerely believe, obtained full value. "It is very gratifying to me to receive from you the assurance that, while actuated solely by the endeavor to do my duty to my employer impartially and without fear, favor or affection; I have also succeeded in gaining the respect and approbation of those with whom I have had business relations, and for this reason the valuable token of your regard will be cherished not only for its intrinsic beauty and utility, but still more because it is to me an expression of your approval of my methods of conducting business with you and those you represent."

DANCED WITHOUT FEET

Tacoma, Aug. 27.—Joseph J. Kocher of Butte, Mont., was run over by the cars at Puyallup and both feet so badly crushed they had to be amputated.

The operation was performed Saturday and Sunday afternoon the patient fell into an apparently natural sleep in the accident ward, where he was confined. For a few minutes no attendants were present in the ward. Presently one of the nurses heard odd sounds coming from the accident ward. She hurried thither to be amazed by the sight of Kocher dancing about on his feetless, bandaged legs. He was in delirium.

Attendants were called and Kocher was placed upon his cot. From that time he sank rapidly and died in the evening.

VOMITED A WORM.

The indictments were drawn so vague that they wouldn't hold water. Attorney General Dole asked for a nolle prosequi in favor of Charles Donahue, charged with selling liquor without a license, and it was granted. His indictment was as shy of criminal details to be proved as the others.

A verdict of not guilty was returned yesterday, after a trial lasting over a day, in the case of Kugichi and Han-zabro, charged with using a knife on another Japanese.
