Life for Criminals.

Mr. George Holland, who died recently at the age of seventy-six, had given his whole life to work among the outcasts of London. The interior says: "Long before any of the emerald settlements were effected Mr. Holland was pursuing his quiet and humble work among the thieves, prostitutes and murderers in the slums of the great city. George's Yard, so-called, is a narrow cul-de-sac in the shipping quarters, where not less than 2,000 persons lived whose names were on the police books as under surveillance. A good many of these were and are criminals of the fourth and fifth generation. They have never known or desired any other life than this of dirt and vice. They have but one aim, to escape work; but one ambition, to outwit the police. Mr. Holland chose wretched dwellings with an ardor not excelled by the chiefest of the apostles."—Public Opinion.
