### KAIULANI FROM HILO

The steamer Kaulani arrived from Hilo and Lahaina early this morning. Captain Dover reports a heavy down-pour of rain from the time he reached Lahaina until off port. Last night it rained so hard that he was unable to see the Diamond Head light until about the station. He was to under the circumstances and waited for daylight to enter the harbor. Two square-riggers and a schooner were seen off to the eastward in the channel early this morning. The schooner is thought to be the El Dorado, which left here yesterday, and the square-riggers may be the bark Albert from Tacoma and the German ship Srene from Bremen, now out over 150 days for this port.

From Hilo to port the sea was almost as smooth as glass and light westerly winds prevailed throughout the trip.

#### NEW WAY OF CATCHING FISH.

W. B. Mead, the New York millionaire, purposes to catch fish by temporarily blinding them. He has fitted out four boats, each seventy-five feet in length, and will send them to the Pacific slope. In this connection he has consulted leading Yale zoological professors and other leading scientists, and has had confirmed his theory that the Yale submarine electric light, flashed in the eyes of a fish, will blind them, cause them to come to the surface and land them in the nets which will be hanging from the sides of the boats. Yale scientists have told him deep sea fishing will be revolutionized by this new method.

The idea of catching fish by blinding them with a powerful light was suggested to Mr. Mead by Francis G. Hall, Jr., and Irving E. Burdick, the Yale men who, three years ago, invented the submarine electric lights. They are the engineers who have fitted up for Mr. Mead his boats, which are now in New York waiting to be despatched to the Pacific. Each boat is to have a separate electric plant of its own. The dynamo, directly connected with a new type of petroleum engine, is to be placed, with its switches, near the engine, permitting the engineer to attend to all conveniently. Wires are to be run from this point to different parts of the boat to supply current for a new portable searchlight projector.

#### HEALANI MATTERS.

The Healani Yacht and Boat Club is having repairs made to its boat house. A short time ago, several leaks in the roof were discovered and men were set to work at once. The repairs will be completed soon.

Efforts are being made to raise money enough for the repainting of the boat house. At the last meeting of the directors \$100 was raised among the members of the club themselves. More money has been promised by other members of the club, their only condition being that the money subscribed shall be taken charge of by the Board of Directors.

#### KICK FROM DIAMOND HEAD.

Captain Peterson the Diamond Head lookout, telephoned to the Rul lath office from the Holmes premises, near the station, this morning, telling of the useless condition of the instrument in his own place. He stated that, whenever it rains, the telephone gets out of order and that he is very tired of trying to get someone to get out from the telephone office to fix it. He says further that the instrument has not been in very long but that it is absolutely useless.
