Late Coffee Report.

Otis, McAllister & Co.'s coffee report under date of Oct. 7 says:

Quite an active business has been done both locally and for overland shipment since our circular of September 7th. Medium grades, after having been more or less neglected for quite a long period, are beginning to attract buyers' attention at present prices.

The New York market, under very adverse statistical conditions, remains firm at an advance of 1/4c during past month. Salvador has advanced 1/4c due to an active local speculative demand and recent further advances of this variety in Europe.

Today's first hand stock consists of 6582 bags Costa Rica, 290 Nicaragua, 6506 Salvador, 38,008 Guatemala, 300 Mexican, and 2011 bags of other kinds; in all 53,897 bags as against 18,530 bags same time last year.
