FIRST AID TO INJURED.

Miss McPherson gave a twenty-minute talk in the Y. W. C. A. rooms yesterday afternoon on "First Aid to the Injured." The lady showed methods of bandaging, using Miss Barnard of Kamehameha school as a subject. The lecturer first told how to arrest hemorrhage from a severed radial artery, applying a tourniquet made from a lead pencil and a handkerchief.

Referring to burns, Miss McPherson said that rugs or anything heavy could be used to put out the flames and keep them off the head. Clothes should then be cut off, never pulled off, and air excluded from the burned parts. Oil of almost any kind was a good thing to use.

Shock generally followed an accident, and in such cases heat should be applied externally, care being used in applying the heat to an unconscious person to prevent burns. Bandaging for burns was done. For stimulants hot coffee, whiskey or a hypodermic were sensible.

For insect bites alkali, cold bicarbonate or ammonia were recommended. Salt and water were excellent emetics for any kind of poison, or even mustard and vinegar. For ant poison the white of an egg was an excellent antidote.

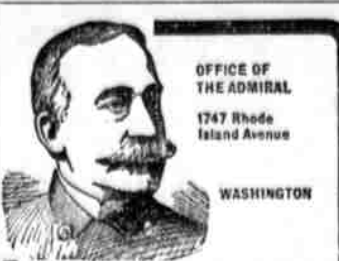
Sails for Manila.
