NO FOREIGN MISSIONS FOR ORIENTALS

"We have no foreign missions for Orientals, but expend this money for the helping of our own people," said Rev. Feinly, when addressing members of the German Lutheran church last night.

The meeting was the annual business gathering and the above remark was made when the Rev. Feinly was giving his statistical report and was telling of the methods used to dispose of the voluntary money contributions for the year. His statistical report showed that at the 73 services held 4650 people had attended, or an average of 96 persons per meeting. The treasurer's report was read, showing that \$4000 had been expended and that there was a balance of \$800 for use the coming year. After the reports were read the minister was engaged for five years more and was granted a six months' vacation. The following trustees were elected: W. Pfothner, president; K. Du Roi, vice president; W. Feinly, assistant vice president; H. Schmitz, treasurer; A. Falke, secretary; P. Lemke and Mr. Gehring, auditors. These are the representatives named for the coming year: Mesdames Schmidt, Ottemba Lillie and Miss Schubert, Messrs. O. Ludloff, W. Koch, A. Ahrens, C. Spohler, B. Gebauer, K. Siebert, G. Becher, Jr., and A. Spiltman, Jr.

Mr. Feinly, when asked about the remark quoted, said that it was not intended as a criticism of other people's methods, but that his people believed in giving "internal" aid to their own race, and not making an "external" showing with another race.

BANGALORE COAL AFIRE

The ship Bangalore has had a narrow escape from the fate which had befallen many a sailing vessel engaged in the dangerous occupation of carrying coal, a cargo which has a bad habit of warming up and breaking into flames at inconvenient times. The Bangalore, Captain Blanchard, has put into Valparaiso with her cargo on fire.

Although well known at this port, it is some time since the Bangalore dropped her anchor in this harbor. She left this coast April 11, 1905, when she sailed for Hilo. She left the Hawaiian port May 15 for Delaware Breakwater and October 6 sailed from Philadelphia on the voyage now interrupted by the conflagration in her hold.

She was bound for Honolulu with a cargo of coal and managed to reach the Pacific before things below got too hot for comfort. No details have been received as to the extent of damage done by the fire, but the fact that she was able to put into Valparaiso insures the safety of those on board.

The Bangalore was built in 1886 at Boston, Me., and is owned by Alexander & Halpin of this city.—Call.

STEAMER KAUI ARRIVES

The steamer Kauai arrived from Hawaii yesterday afternoon with 1150 sacks of sugar consigned to Irwin & Co., and 50 head of cattle. The steamer Kauai is placing buoys at Papeete.

The Honokaa mill started grinding yesterday, as did the Kukui. The Papaaloa will begin some time the early part of next month. The Honolulu and the Pepeekeo mills also began moving this week. A total of 24,700 sacks of sugar is awaiting at the other mills on Hawaii.
