PORTUGUESE IMMIGRANTS HAVE SAILED FOR HAWAII

Funchal Madeira Island Oct. 11, 1906

Hawaiian Immigration Board, Honolulu, T.H.

Suveric sailed, 1325 people. Early December arrival.

Stackable---Frazer

This cablegram received this morning by Secretary J. P. Cooke of the Board of Immigration tells in brief the story of the success of Commissioners Stackable and Frazer in obtaining Portuguese immigrants for Hawaii.

Mr. Cooke was very much elated when the cablegram was received and members of the Board immediately started in with plans for the enlistment of another lot of immigrants as rapidly as possible.

The cablegram is interpreted to

mean that the steamer Suveric sailed this morning with 1,325 immigrants on board for this port and is expected to arrive here early in the month of December.

The Suveric was chartered in London by Collector Stackable the latter part of September. She is a new steamer of 4,020 tons register and owned by Andrew Weir & Co., of Glasgow. This company has of late been changing its sailing ships to steamers and building new ones. It is developing a trade with the Pacific

and has already sent ships to the Pacific Coast.

When the first cable was received announcing that Stackable had chartered the ship, Commissioner Tenney said he hoped the first lot of immigrants would number from a thousand to twelve hundred persons. The cable this morning shows that his hopes have been fulfilled.

The Suveric will come around the Horn and presumably direct to Honolulu. It is supposed that she has a cargo for some part of the Pacific Coast but will land her passengers

first at Honolulu.

The immigrants on landing will immediately be given the opportunity of obtaining work and homes on the plantations of the islands.

As plans are maturing for the immediate enlistment of another lot, it is possible that two steamer loads will be obtained before the opening of the Tehuantepec route.

Some of those interested are fearful of the effect the long trip around Cape Horn will have on future efforts to enlist these home-builders. It is a long trip and not a pleasant one at best.

Should it be particularly stormy, the report sent back is not likely to be the most satisfactory promotion literature for the next lot.

However, if the avenues for European immigrants are once opened up, not more than one additional trip around the Horn will be necessary. The other route will be quicker and more comfortable in every way.

The first successful step having been taken, there is a general feeling that a good advance has been made toward solving the labor problem of the islands.

GROSS COMPLAINT IS FILED BY SCROGGY

Says He Built Transfer Firm Up By His Own Work

The answer of the defendant in the suit for a dissolution of partnership of James H. Love vs. A. D. Scroggy was filed this morning with Judge De Witt. It is a long and interesting statement of the conduct of the business of the Pacific Transfer Company under Mr. Scroggy's management and contains also a cross complaint asking that the court appoint a receiver who shall close out the business of the firm by sale and otherwise at once and divide the amount realized between the two partners.

It sets forth that the amount invested by Love originally in the business was \$1600 instead of \$2863 as claimed

and that Scroggy first went into the business when Love went to the mainland and that in the six months that he was gone built up a good business which was allowed to go to pieces when he returned. Then the partnership was formed and through an untiring attention on the part of Scroggy to his business while Love did little of the work which was expected of him, the firm has built up so that other departments have been added, and it is now a business in which the profits run up as high as \$500 per month.

The business for the first six months of three years is given as a proof of this as follows: 1903, \$2848; 1905, \$5030; 1906, \$6092. In the cross complaint it is alleged that Love paid so little attention to the welfare of the business that he would collect large sums of money and keep them in his pocket for days when it was needed for use by the firm to buy wood and other fuel and that the firm was unable to take advantage of good bargains on account of this.

It seems that arrangements had been made for Scroggy to buy out Love and handle the business himself when the suit was brought without any notice by the latter.
