# \$700,000 Appropriation Is Passed For Seattle Fair

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 6 .- The Senate has passed the Seattle Exposition bill, carrying an appropriation of \$700,000

# Don't Like Aldrich Bill

NEW YORK, N. Y., Feb. 6 .- The New York Merchants' Association as passed resolutions opposing the Aldrich currency bill, characterizing It as a dangerous makeshift.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 27 .- According to those "close up," It is certain that the Aldrich financial bill will be reported next Monday, and that it will go through the House without delay.

The bill would be reported by the committee sooner but for Secretary Cortelyou's delay in making his report to the Senate, and the desire of the President to go over the report carefully himself before allowing it to go to the Capitol. Of course, the Senate could have gone ahead with the Aldrich bill anyway, but having asked Cortelyou to make the report, it was not apparent how legislation could be decently enacted with out waiting for it.

Fowler, chalrman of the House Committee on Banking and Curency, made an elaborate speech today on his own currency bill, but it s said that he is reconciled to see his bill sidetracked to make way for the Aldrich act. In fact, the story is out that Fowler was to have been eposed, but by promising the Spea ker that he would accept the Aldrich bill he was permitted to hold the c hairmanship. The Aldrich bill is described as merely a logical extension of the present system, but the Republicans feel that they are compelled to do something, and that even in unsatisfactory bill will be hailed as better than nothing.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 27.-The complete text of the Aldrich financial bill, which will be submitted to the full committee after a meeting has been held to go over the data from the Treasury Department, will contain the amendments that have been tentatively agreed to at the various meetings of the Committee on Finance.

It will be made mandatory upon the Secretary of the Treasury to nake and keep on hand a supply of notes which can be quickly issued upon call. The Secretary of the Treasury will be required to proceed mmediately upon the law taking effect to gather data concerning—the new class of securities provided by the measure. The bonds of every city in the country will be inspected and their worth stated in Treasury reports, as will be done with any securities that are at any time liable to ome within the workings of any emergency currency law. It has been settled that the distribution of the currency will be by States, instead of intricts, as formerly proposed.
