TROUBLE FOR HAWAII COUNTY SUPERVISORS

Large Bunch of Claims Repudiated By Board

The Hawaii Herald issued an extra on June 5 in which the particulars of the meeting of the Hawaii Board of Supervisors, at which it was decided to impeach Supervisors Purdy and Kalaiwaa, are given as follows:

At the meeting of the Board of Supervisors, which did not terminate till 5:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, the report of a majority of the Finance Committee was adopted which recommended the "immediate impeachment" of Supervisors Purdy and Kalaiwaa.

The Finance Committee consists of: Kalaiwaa, chairman; Supe and Keaki. Naturally the chairman did not sign the report. It was presented to the Board by Supe who moved its adoption, Shipman seconding. The vote of the Board by which it was adopted stood 4 to 3, Todd joining with Purdy and Kalaiwaa against; while Keaki, Shipman, Supe and Woods voted for its adoption. Purdy spoke against the adoption of the report, defending his actions. That portion of the report bearing upon the matter of impeachment is as follows:

North and South Kona Bills.

"In reference to the claims of the Kona-Kau Telephone Co., telephone reft \$5.00, and T. Matsumoto for supplies \$1.90, against the District of South Kona; and also the claims of J. Kalemakule Jr., road supervisor for \$50.00; Kona-Kau Telephone Co. for telephone reft \$5.00; T. Kuamoto for materials and supplies \$25.30; J. Kalekule for materials \$54.00; Richards and Schoen for one set harness \$35.00, against the District of North Kona, your Committee recommend that same be not paid, because the expenditures were unauthorized and contrary to the terms of Resolution No. 44, adopted February 6th, 1908, and which reads as follows:

"Resolved that the Supervisors, and Road Supervisors shall not expending in the repairing of damages interfering with traffic, caused by the elements, incur debts more than the credit allowed and set apart to each district at the time, excepting as otherwise allowed by the Board."

Hamakua's Little List.

"The District of Hamakua also has various claims filed against it as follows:

Impeachment Recommended.

"These claims your Committee also recommend be not paid, for the same reasons given for not paying the claims against North and South Kona. And in this connection your Committee recommends that the persistence by the Hon. Mr. Purdy and Kalaiwaa, in ignoring the wishes of this Honorable Board, by incurring expenses unauthorized in the Districts which they represent, which said Districts are in debt shall constitute and be a suitable, proper and legal ground for their immediate impeachment."

Other matters of interest touched upon by the Finance Committee were: Bill of the Honolulu Iron Works, \$2,647, for rock crusher, was deferred. The same company's claim for \$104.08 was ordered to be sent to the proper parties as thereon mentioned.

First of The Junketing Bills.

In re demands Nos. 2970, 2971, 2972, 2973, 2974, 2975, 2976, 2977, 2978 and 2979, incurred by the Roads and Bridges Committee, amounting to \$79.95, your Committee recommend be not allowed, the same being not authorized by the Board.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Should any action be taken tending to the impeachment of Supervisors Purdy and Kalaiwaa, proceedings must be recommenced in the Supreme Court of the Territory. The charge would probably be "Maladministration in office, under subsection 3, Section 2, Chapter 14 of the County Act which gives the Board power to make regulations.

"To authorize and supervise the expenditure of all funds belonging to the County."

SUNDAY SCHOOL PICNIC AT PAIA

Special Children's Day Program Was Given at Foreign Church Last Sunday.

On last Saturday, May 6th, a delightful picnic was given at Sunny-side, Makawao, by Rev. and Mrs. E. B. Turner to the home department of the Sunday school that has recently been organized on Maui.

Mrs. H. P. Baldwin is superintendent of the Maui home department. The aim of this department is that every adult person not at present in Sunday school work study the Bible at home during the week. This plan of systematic Bible study is being widely and successfully adopted throughout the States. At Paia there is already a very large enrollment of members.

The picnic of last Saturday was intended to be first of all a reception to the home department, which was well represented, but the children and young people were also present, who helped to make the exercises full of interest to all.

After the opening hymn, "Onward, Christian Soldiers," Rev. E. B. Turner gave an address of welcome, in which he stated the purpose and work of the new department. Revs. R. B. Dodge and Theodore A. Wiltrip followed with brief remarks. The rest of the program consisted of songs and recitations by various classes of the Sunday school and the Maunaloa Seminary girls.

About one hundred and seventy people were then served with refreshments.

On Sunday there was a special Children's Day program at the Paia Foreign Church. The auditorium was not large enough for the congregation that overflowed into the parlors, while many people could not find chairs at all. The primary and intermediate departments, which had the larger part of the service, interested all who heard them. Miss Matson sang Handel's "He Shall Feed His Flock Like a Shepherd." Rev. E. B. Turner made an address upon "Child Heroes." The collection was devoted to the Japanese Day Nursery.
