FLEET ADVANCING AT TEN KNOT SPEED ROW STIRS UP IAUKEA'S POLICE FORCE

108 Are Examined; 38 Teachers Pass

One hundred and eight teachers took the recent teachers' examinations, and out of this number but thirty-eight received certificates. Five papers were thrown out because of dishonest work in the examinations. There were two first-class certificates granted, eight second-class, and twenty-eight third-class. One second-class paper and one third-class were thrown out entirely because of cheating. The others were among the ranks of the many who did not pass the "quizzes."

Mrs. Lillian S. Mesick of the Huleia school, on Kauai, was one of the two to receive a first-class certificate, the other name being withheld by request.

On account of the fact that some of the teachers whose marks did not quite justify their being given certificates are doing out knowledge in the outlying districts, such as Kona, and therefore making it hard to get someone to take their places, these will be retained in a great many instances.

Iaukea May Clean Out Whole Detective Force

No formal notice has been given by Chief of Detectives Taylor of his intention to resign from the police department, but he has told the Sheriff that he intends to do so in September. In the police station it is the general impression that this step is the result of friction between the detective force and the other branches of the department, and that this has culminated in the affair between Fred Iaukea and Detective Reeves, who is Taylor's right-hand man. This impression is somewhat strengthened by the statement of the Sheriff to the effect that there has been considerable friction, but Taylor states that this has nothing to do with his action which, he says, has for a long time past been contemplated by him. However, the practical result may be the discharge of the entire detective force.

"As a matter of fact, I only intend-

ed to stay in this position for a year," said Taylor this forenoon, "and this was the understanding when I accepted the position. When I left for the Coast it was my intention to resign after my return, but shortly after that the explosion occurred at my house, and I did not like to resign just then, as it would look too much like cowardice. Now I will stay until September, as I have a number of cases which will come up about then. My wife has become very nervous ever since I have held this position, and this is one of my reasons for resigning."

"The Reeves affair has nothing whatever to do with my resignation. It did not affect me in the least, except possibly as a matter of discipline. There is nothing behind my move, certainly nothing of a political character. I am not seeking any of-

CULGOA HEARD BY WIRELESS OF GLACIER

Auxiliary Fleet Coming
Fast Into This
Port

The fleet of auxiliaries and tenders which precedes the big Fleet, is coming into port in daily detachments. With the Glacier in day before yesterday, the Panther, Yankton, and Ajax in yesterday, the Culgoa was talking with the Glacier by wireless this morning, and it is probable that she will make port this afternoon, together with the Relief, hospital ship of the armada.

The Panther and the Yankton, repair ship and dispatch boat respectively, came into the harbor shortly after 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The Panther is in command of Commander V. S. Nelson, and the smaller vessel is in charge of Lieutenant Commander H. K. Gise.

The Yankton is very interesting in view of the fact that she is a converted yacht, first launched as the Sapphire, owned by an English gentleman, and later purchased by Sarah Bernhardt, and rechristened the Cleopatra. Then she became the prop-

MONEY QUESTION IS A PUZZLER

Fleet Committee Does
Not Know How Much
It Has

The question of the Fleet fund as it stands today is somewhat puzzling the Executive Committee. The appropriations exceed the cash on hand. The Japanese Fleet fund which it was understood to be turned over to the Ways and Means Committee may not be available, as it is reported to be the intention of the Japanese Committee to expend it for the free transportation of the men of the Fleet. L. T. Peck, chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, will communicate with D. Yonekura of the Japanese Fleet Committee and ascertain from him how it intends to use the fund. For this reason, no further appropriations were made today at the Executive Committee meeting.

At the request of Eben Low, the band was allotted to the Wild West Show, which takes place on Friday and Saturday, July 17th and 18th. Alexander Young reported that the hotels were in readiness. F. B. McSocker reported that his committee-men were at work. He wanted \$100 appropriated for a room in the Young Hotel, but it was denied him for lack of funds. The report of the Transportation Committee will be received on next Monday.

8 BATTLESTIPS TO COAL OFF LAHAINA

Rees Gets Cable From
Sperry--Will Four
Coal At Once?

Captain Corwin P. Rees, commandant at the Naval Station, this morning received a cable from Admiral Sperry, commanding officer of the Atlantic Fleet, to the effect that the two colliers, Buchrania and Cragvar, are to go to Maalea Bay, coast of Maui, and wait there to coal eight battleships. This is the full extent of the cable, and no further details are officially known.

There is a rumor at the Naval Station that this probably means that four ships will go to Maui at a time to coal, but as to whether this is actually the case, or whether Honolulu will get only eight ships at once, is not definitely known.
