HEARST CHARGES HURT

New York, Sept. 21.—The New York Press today has the following news report of the conference between W. J. Bryan, Norman H. Mack, National Democratic chairman, and D. Cady Herrick in Albany: "Chairman Mack and Bryan talked over the Hearst charges against Governor Haskell, of Oklahoma, the treasurer of the Democratic national committee. Parker's advice was sought in this instance. Mack was reticent on his return last night when questioned about Haskell; but he intimated that although Senator Foraker had been driven out of the Taft campaign by Hearst's accusations in connection with Standard Oil, Haskell will not quit so easily.

"He will rest his case steadily on a flat denial of the truth of Hearst's accusations. "It is evident, however, that Bryan, Mack and other Democratic leaders are embarrassed seriously by Hearst's charge that Standard Oil interests are on friendly terms with Bryan in this campaign. Bryan, it was learned, intended to make a great play in the west on his assertion that the Steel Trust is supporting the Taft campaign.

Bank Guarantee a Strong Card "One of Bryan's closest friends said yesterday the Nebraska plan will make most prominent hereafter his plan to have national banks guarantee their deposits, as he believes this is a popular cry. Bryan has said confidentially that he believes the bank guarantee plan is one of his strongest issues in this campaign, as it has been well received everywhere he has used it for a text.

Another change has been made necessary in Bryan's plans. He was preparing to give Hearst as ready "in cabinet" with the Republicans for a consideration, but Hearst's attack on Foraker and the consternation it has caused in Republican ranks will cause Bryan to show in assailing Hearst along the line planned.

Prominent Democrats advised Bryan yesterday that Hearst is injuring the Republican party even more than he is hurting Bryan, and that it would be best for Bryan to give him plenty of rope and pay no little attention to him as possible.

PEKIN, China, Oct. 3.—Chung Men Yew, the new Chinese Minister to the United States, who is to succeed Wu Tingfang in December, left here last week with Tang Shao Yi, the envoy of the Emperor, who started on his trip around the world.

The Imperial envoy and his suite are going to America by way of Japan. Tang Shao Yi's mission is to thank the United States Government for the remission of a portion of the Boxer indemnity and to try to enlist the aid of Americans in the development of Northern China.

Minister Wu will receive the envoy and Chung Men Yew when they reach Washington, after which he will retire from his post as Minister.

WATERFRONT NOTES

THE STEAMER Ke An Hou arrived from Kaula at 8:30 o'clock this morning, carrying one lone Chinaman as a deck passenger and a quantity of miscellaneous freight. There were no cabin passengers on board.

Washington, September 20.—Dr. L. von Pirquet of Vienna, Austria, the discoverer of the procedure of inoculation of tubercle bacillus as a means of diagnosis, today inoculated more children at the Children's Hospital and also one trained nurse, whose name it was impossible to obtain. This following so closely on yesterday's inoculation of ten children by Dr. Detre aroused great interest among the delegation and was the main feature of the day.

Over 100 physicians, foreign and American, witnessed the tests. Some of the subjects were negro children. It is said that Dr. Detre's tests on Monday had shown that several of the children inoculated had bovine infection. Others have mixed bovine and human tuberculosis, while still others have only human consumption. This information is highly important to the medical profession.

Tests Harmless in Claim. Speaking of his tests, Dr. von Pirquet said: "These inoculated tests are only diagnostic. In Berlin we make them thousands of times to find out the tubercle subjects. Having found them out, we separate them from the other patients. "It does not injure them at all. We apply it to kindergarten scholars in Germany and when we find children suffering from tuberculosis we segregate them."

Dr. von Pirquet said it was also employed in the public schools of Germany, and he has frequently applied the test to his own army. Dr. G. N. Aelter, physician in charge of the Children's Hospital said that the children were doing well and had not been injured in the least.

Confirms Diagnosis. "This test," continued the doctor, "is commonly employed in hospitals and has been employed in the Children's Hospital from time to time since the test has been known to confirm the diagnosis of tuberculosis. "There are three tests. One is known as the Chalmette test, the tuberculin being put in the eye of the subject. Then there is the von Pirquet test, which was made this afternoon at the hospital, the tuberculin being used on the surface of the skin, the same as in vaccination. The third is the Detre test, which was made at the hospital Monday. The latter is unique to distinguish between the bovine and human tuberculosis, both human and bovine bacillus being employed.

"To many of the visitors the goal of their visit is the rather gruesome but interesting exhibit of live bacilli and microbes. New York Leads World. At a section meeting this morning Dr. Robert Koch, the father of Anti-Tuberculous Science, said that New York city led the world in its handling of the tuberculous problem, and in its prevention. His remarks were all the more forcible because they were impromptu.

Dr. Arthur Nowchohne, one of the highest medical authorities in England, also took occasion to say that he knows of no city where the total programme for prevention of consumption is so complete as it is in New York. He said that in England the public would not yet permit of such forcible measures as New York has taken. Dr. J. Woods Price of Saranac Lake, New York, contributed one of the rare papers free from toxin too technical for the lay mind. His subject was the "Possibilities of infection from table utensils at banquets." He said, in part: "Tableware Danger Slight. "Torks, spoons, tea cups and milk glasses in constant use by advanced tuberculous patients were used for these experiments. On the first day thirty forks and twenty-five spoons, tumblers and tea cups were chosen immediately after ordinary good washing, but not sterilization and cleansed with sterile 5 per cent sodium bicarbonate solution by means of sterile cotton swabs and the washings distributed among fifty-six women plus by injection. No knowledge of the inoculated experiment was conveyed to the hospital nurses or maids. All the pigs were killed in forty-one days and found to be free from tuberculous infection.

"On the second, several months later, articles of each sort, immediately after use and before washing of any kind as described above and the washing injected into guinea pigs, two pigs to each five articles. These animals were killed in forty-one days after inoculation and all were found to be tuberculous except those inoculated with the washings from the milk glasses. "While the sterilization of tableware used by consumptives is not to be discouraged, the danger from infection from that source, when it is not possible, does not seem to be great."

The daylight limit of the Illinois Central railroad between Chicago and St. Louis was wrecked near Springfield, Ill., and a piece of the engine struck and killed Elizabeth McGuire, 8 years old, who was playing 200 feet away from the track. Ethel Barrymore, the actress, was dragged through the window of a wrecked car by a porter.
