The inmates of the house were aroused, and a general hubbub followed, which was broken by the arrival of Officers Mokuama and Humeku. The soldiers tried to escape, but were arrested and taken to the station. This morning they appeared in court on charges of being on the premises of another at night without lawful excuse, but at the request of an officer from the camp, they were turned over to the military authorities, by whom they will undoubtedly be severely punished.

The police state that while the soldiers who have been here for some time are a very well behaved set, the ones who have arrived but recently are the cause of considerable trouble. It was also reported to the police last night that a Chinese had been severely beaten on the corner of King and Maunakea streets, but while the man was found in a battered condition, he was not able to give any information as to the identity of his assailants.
