PETITION SENT BY MASTERS AND PILOTS

The local harbor of the Masters' and Pilots' Association has sent twelve pe titions for improvements to be asked for from Congress to the convention of Grand Harbor Officers, which meets at Washington this month. The needs are set forth as follows:

At Kahului-A fourth order fixed red light on the end of the breakwater; a gas buoy on the outer edge of the Waihee reef; a gas buoy on the outer edge of the Spartan reef; a gas buoy to re place the starboard outer buoy marking the harbor entrance; the government to take over the present range lights and move them about 450 feet to the westward.

At Keanae, Maui-A suitable light. At Puniawa, Maui-A suitable light. At Napill Point, Maul-A fourth or der light.
