FRENCH MINISTRY OUT

Under dramatic circumstances at the conclusion of a violent debate over the naval scandal, Premier Clemenceau taunted ex-Minister of Foreign Affairs Delcasse over the humiliation of the latter at the Algerias conference. Smarting under the words of the Premier, Delcasse replied vigorously. Premier Clemenceau apparently lost his head. Amidst the wildest excitement the Chamber of Deputies on a vote defeated the Government. Clemenceau and the other ministers immediately resigned.

WRIGHA'S FLIGHT NEW RECORD.

RITHEY ADDS TO ITS REPUTATION

Another Sailor Fined For Drunkenness This Morning

The crew of the sailing vessel R. P. Rithet added to its reputation with the police authorities this morning when Denis Bryan, a sailor, was convicted of drunkenness before Judge Andrade and fined \$3 and costs.

Bryan was in a very nervous condition and was very shaky as he walked to the bar. He looked as if he had been on a continuous drinking bout of some weeks.

"This is the first time I have been here," he said in a trembling voice, "and I won't come back," scratching his head vigorously and clasping and unclasping his hands.

"You are on the verge of D. T. now," said Judge Andrade. "Three dollars and costs."

"Will you send to the ship," was asked by the prisoner in the same trembling tones.

"Sure" was the reply.

With regard to the condition of the first mate of this vessel by name of Erickson who was severely beaten up by the second mate Carlson, the former being in hospital and the latter in jail, the following is the report received from the Queen's Hospital this morning from the authorities there: "He is doing very nicely. His face is very much lacerated and he has two lovely black eyes but he will be all right in a day or two."

HUGHES MAY BE MADE SUPREME COURT JUDGE

President Taft Will Offer Place to Governor

Washington, July 19.—There is a strong impression in New York and Vermont that President Taft will offer Governor Hughes the first vacancy that occurs in the United States supreme court.

The tender of the appointment is regarded as contingent upon the coming of the vacancy at a time when the New York governor can accept it. Many friends of Governor Hughes do not think he would accept the appointment should it be offered.

The determination of President Taft to offer Governor Hughes a place on the supreme bench is the immediate result of their several days of discussion at the Lake Champlain celebration just ended.
