SUGAR

Willet & Gray's Sugar Journal for Nov. 18 says of the raw sugar markets:

RAWS.—The irregular market for spot and nearby sugars noted last week still continues. The spot stock was reduced by the sale of 2,000 tons of Java sugars in store here to go to Canada at 42c, basis 96" test, taken at the store, which is the equivalent of 45c, regular store terms.

Cuba discovered another 5,000 bags Centrifugals in the outports and sold them for prompt shipment at 31-16c. c. & f., 96" test, equal to 4.42c landed, to the Howell Refineries, establishing spot quotation at 4.42c, for 96" test, which remains unchanged at the close.

As to distant sugars, the Warner Refinery purchased 20,000 bags Centrifugals for shipment not later than January 20th at 27c. c. & f. (4.11c), and further sales for January shipment to refiners were reported on the same basis.

European operators also continued buying to the extent of some 200,000 bags for December-January of 27c. c. & f. and February-March at 2 11-16c. c. & f. (4.05c). December shipment is held at 27c. c. & f., equal to 4.24c. landed.

During the week a further advance was made in the European movement from 12s. 2 1/2d. to 12s. 6 1/2d., reaching at the close to 12s. 5 1/2d. Future months made corresponding advances in which cane sugars also participated to the extent of 3d. The only news given out accounting for the advance was that F. O. Licht cabled us that he would probably reduce his October estimate for Germany. This estimate now stands at 2,150,000 tons, against the last year output of 2,080,000 tons, but the so-called factories estimate is 1,948,540 tons, or say 201,460 tons less than F. O. Licht's, which gives the latter a good margin for reduction and the revised estimates should be at hand almost immediately. The earlier quotations at the close are no doubt owing to the delay in the publication of the reduced estimate.

From Cuba, we have Messrs. Guma Meyer's published final statistics showing the output of the last Cuba crop, just ended, which reached the large total of 1,513,582 tons sugar, against 961,958 tons in 1907-8 and 1,427,673 tons in 1906-7. The weather conditions are favorable for the growing crop; the date for the beginning of

harvesting is not yet fixed, although it is said that a few factories may make a start about the first of December in order to avail themselves of all good weather to grind the unusually large amount of cane in the fields this season, which is likely to produce some 200,000 tons in excess of last season under favorable conditions.

Just at this time we pass over from the lowest sugar supplies in the world to the accumulation added by new crop statistics. It is interesting to note that last week recorded the lowest visible supplies of sugar, including all European ports, the United States and Cuba, as well as afloat. Of course, the European figures are of uneven dates, as usually noted. Upon this basis, the visible supply of sugar in the world, November 12th, was 619,238 tons against 799,620 tons for the corresponding date last year. The additions to the visible supplies caused by corrections of European stocks, to November 18th, and additions from new crop beet sugars give 895,219 tons increase in the visible to 1,505,557 tons but the increase last year for the corresponding time was 1,171,358 tons larger, making the visible then 1,979,578 tons.

Regarding the West Indies, a hurricane passed over the island of Jamaica and part of San Domingo, but had no effect in Cuba, where the weather continues favorable.

The outlook remains unchanged for the continuance of present quotations during the time that must elapse before the marketing of new crop Cuba Centrifugals eases the situation.
