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## PROHIBITION STUNT TO MISLEAD VOTERS ENA'S CAPTAIN DIES ON RECORD VOYAGE

### Confuse Voter Is Now Object

False Report Being Spread That  
 Vote Of "Yes" Is Against  
 Woolley Plans

In accordance with what appears to be a concerted effort to confuse the voter on the methods of registering his opinion on the Woolley-Thurston platform Tuesday, the report is being carefully spread to the general effect that if the voter is against prohibition he will cast his vote by marking a cross in the square opposite the word "Yes," and the Hawaiian equivalent "ae" on the ballot.

A particular effort has been made to spread this interpretation of the method of voting Tuesday among the Hawaiians who are inclined to be in some doubt as to the proper manner of registering their objection to saddling the Territory with the blight of prohibition.

This effort at confusing the voter is apparently one of the last guns in the Woolley campaign and indicates the lengths to which some of the runners in the Woolley cause are prepared to go.

### Opium Coming In From the Coast

Seven Tins Worth \$450 Taken  
 From Arizonan Cooks Who  
 Are In Custody

Five tins of unstamped and two held for investigation by United States Attorney Beckons and seized this morning on board the American-Hawaiian steamer Arizonan by Customs Inspector R. J. Taylor working in connection with a searching party from the Revenue Cutter Thetis.

Two tins were found in the storeroom belonging to Second Cook Leong Sang, and five tins were found in the store-room which is in charge of Cook Chun Fook.

Five tins of stamped opium of a total market value in Honolulu of \$450 were seized this morning before United States Commissioner Albert F. Judd. The hearing of Sang was completed shortly after noon and he was bound over to the October term of the Federal Court, bail being fixed in the sum of \$750. Chun Fook was examined this afternoon.

For many weeks the steamers of American-Hawaiian Company have been under close surveillance as it is

### SHIP JOHN ENA SETS NEW MARK 'ROUND HORN

News came today of the ship John Ena having completed the trip from this port to Philadelphia in eighty-four days. She arrived July 21 and sailed from Honolulu April 28.

This is one of the most remarkable trips on record. The only thing that comes anywhere near it, as given in Thrum's Annual, was when the American ship N. B. Palmer, in 1854, made the trip from Honolulu to New York in eighty-one days.

The ship John Ena left here with a full cargo of sugar, under Captain N. Lorenz.

Captain Lorenz died on the trip while the ship was off Cape Horn and was buried at sea. The first mate, whose name could not be learned, took the ship to her destination.

### \$100,000 FIRE WIPES OUT PAIA STORE

 WAILUKU, Maui, July 22.—The Paia store and the plantation office adjoining were completely burned to the ground at two o'clock this morning. The grain and flour warehouses were saved.

The property loss will amount to more than one hundred thousand dollars. It is covered by insurance.

The origin of the fire is thought to be incendiary.

Mr. John Waterhouse of Alexander & Baldwin stated this morning that the headquarters of the Maui Agricultural Company were in the same building as the Paia store. The building was a large one, of frame and galvanized iron. Adjoining the store were several big warehouses containing a quantity of supplies and merchandise. The Paia store is said to have been the best equipped and carried the largest stock of any similar establishment on the islands.
