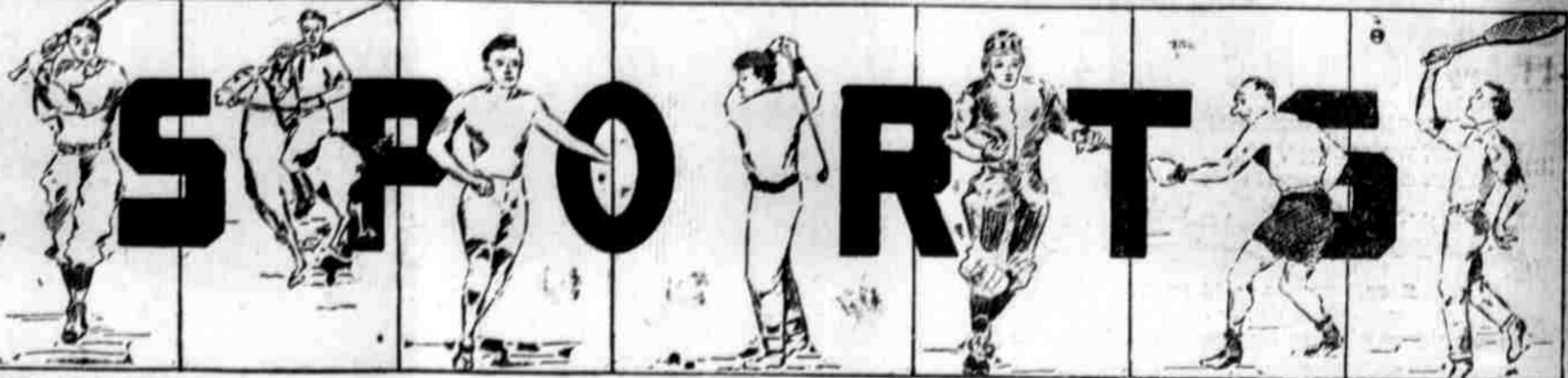

INTER-ISLAND POLO GAME BETWEEN OAHU AND KAUAI

This afternoon at the Moanalua field, the Kauai and Oahu polo teams will hitch up for a game that should keep the spectators on the tip-toe of excitement during the whole sign period. The game last Wednesday between the Garden Island representatives and the Fifth Cavalry gave people a taste of the sort of polo that is going to be seen this season. The struggle was the fiercest ever seen on a local polo field, and it was a most exciting game.

The Kauaians have shown that they can play the game, and their ponies are also up to the job. The pace that they set right from the start was furious, and the dashing riding of Malina and the Rice brothers was a treat to watch. In having so many ponies, the Kauai men are lucky, as they need not overwork any of their mounts. It remains to be seen how the Oahu men will fare, with a limited number of horses.

However, in Walter Dillingham, Harold Dillingham, Dr. and Sam Baldwin, the home team have four great players, and the prospects of a fast game are bright. The dashings Sam will make Malina look to his shame, and when the doctor gets going with one of his famous runs down the field, there will be joy among the rooters for Oahu. The doctor is left-handed, and he is a formidable man to try and ride off. He will be well mounted, and is relied upon to play a great game for Honolulu.

Walter Dillingham will once more get into the game, and if he is as brilliant as he was last season, he will make the Kauai men play the game of their lives to prevent him from scoring. Walter will be well mounted, and that goes a long way in any game. If he can only get going on a good run, the probabilities are that he will score for his side.

Harold Dillingham has been out of regular polo for some time now. Still, he plays a good game, and the practice he has had lately has enabled him to get his eye in and to show glimpses of good form. The Kauai men play such hard polo that it is easily seen that the Oahu men will be up against a tough proposition this afternoon. All the same, the home team carries the hopes of the Honolulu people, and it is thought that, even playing with a limited number of ponies, the Dillingham-Baldwin combination will hold its own with the four from the Garden Island.

The Maui players will all be here in a couple of days. Frank Baldwin is today busy playing tennis at Punene against the Honolulu bunch of visitors. The Honolulu tennis men should have a great time on Maui, and although they will miss the Kauai-Oahu game of polo, they will be back in plenty of time for the Maui-Kauai game, which promises to be the hottest and best of the inter-island series.

The day that Maui and Kauai meet on the polo field will be long remembered by those fortunate enough to be present. From all points the struggle should be a beauty, and it is hard to predict how the game will end. The game this afternoon should be good also, but that between Maui

and Oahu next week should prove to be the best ever played on this island.

The game this afternoon will begin at 2 o'clock, and by that time a big crowd of spectators should be gathered around the beautiful field at Moanalua. The crowd promises to be much larger than that of Wednesday last, and there is no doubt that everybody will be rewarded by seeing one of the best games played here for a long time.

G. Judd will probably umpire the game, and the other officials will be the same as on Wednesday last, when everything went off so smoothly. Afternoon tea will be served at the end of the game, and the event will be a society one in which all the well-known people of Honolulu will take part.

OAHU JUNIORS TO PLAY AFTERNOON BALL GAME
