FIVE LABORERS HAVE VARIOLOID

**Workmen Stricken On Maui
Late Arrived From
This City.**

News reached Honolulu by the steamer Claudine this morning that the epidemic of varioloid, or smallpox, which has broken out on Maui first made its appearance among Filipinos who had arrived from Honolulu only a few days before. With this information, the local health authorities are expected to get busy and endeavor to trace the course of the disease here.

With epidemics of diphtheria and typhoid threatening the community, the Maui Chamber of Commerce has taken the matter up. A meeting of the chamber was held in the town hall at Wailuku last Saturday, Vice-President Wadsworth presiding. There were nineteen members present, and as a quorum is twenty, no official meeting of the chamber was held, but the outbreak of disease was given free discussion. Among those present were Harry and Frank Baldwin, L. von Tempsey, Judge Klumbury, Secretary D. H. Case, J. N. Williams, D. C. Landay, and W. O. Aiken.

Five cases of varioloid were discovered yesterday in Camp 5 near the mill at Spanish camp among the Filipino men and women, and news brought back by the Claudine this morning is to the effect that all have been removed under strict quarantine to Camp 12 near Kihohi. The Filipinos had arrived from Honolulu last month.

CIGARS NOT CLASSED BRIBE

Was an attempt made to bribe Clerk Fred Weed, at central police station, when De Gussman, a Filipino, is alleged by last official to have approached and extended a cigar, neatly wrapped in tinfoil and bearing a well-known Manila label? The genial Frederick was placed on the stand this morning. Before a thronged courtroom, over which presided District Magistrate Lymer, Weed acknowledged that he had been offered a "weed." De Gussman was then under a charge of employing threatening language towards a Russian named Waldemar Tarnoffsky. "I will kill you," are declared to have been the words used by the Filipino in addressing the subject of the Little White Father, at a mingling of nationalities on lower King street on December 13. The trial has occupied the greater portion of the time and attention of the court and sev-

eral attorneys for the past two days. De Gussman was represented by Attorney Claudius McBride. Arrayed against him was the legal machinery of the city and county, operated by Deputy Attorney Fred Milverton. Many were the passages that the sparring legal lights enjoyed in the course of the protracted hearing.

Tarnoffsky demanded that De Gussman be placed under a bond to keep the peace. This sentence was finally voted out to the defendant at noon today, when Judge Lymer reviewed the case. He fixed the sum of \$75 as about right to insure De Gussman keeping a better guard over his tongue. McBride gave notice of appeal to a higher tribunal. De Gussman is a defendant in an action taken by a Russian named Sternberg, who has alleged that the Filipino is guilty of adultery with his wife. This matter comes up for preliminary hearing on December 27, next morning. "I do not approve of a lot of witnesses coming in and drawing a dollar a piece as witness fees, so I enter a plea of guilty to the charge of larceny," was the statement made by Carlos Santos when arraigned before Judge Lymer at the District Court this morning.

OAHU GOES AT A BRISK PACE

**More Than Five Hundred
Shares Sold Today at
25 Flat**

Oahu furnished the excitement on Brokers' Row today, although it was a mild form of excitement. Five hundred and ten shares of this stock were sold at 25, the blocks being four of 100 each, two of 50 and one of 10.

Outside of this there was little to mention. The market is firm, with plenty of demand if the price seems right, and "right" now means low.

Brokers figure there will be little trading until after the holidays, many investors holding off because of the talk of threatened cuts in dividends. There is some talk of the stock exchange taking a vacation next week. The usual vacation last fall was postponed owing to the crit-

ical condition of the market, but now seems to be a good time for the dealers in securities to rest themselves in preparation for a strenuous year.

INJURED BY SHOT FROM AIR RIFLE

The little six-year-old daughter of Jack McGuire was injured at noon today by a shot fired from an air rifle in the hands of a Chinese lad named Tim Shin.

The boy and gun were brought to police station. The little girl was conveyed to the Queen's Hospital. The injuries, while not considered serious, are, nevertheless, very painful.

GENETT AGAIN IN THE TOILS

Edward Genett is again in the toils as a result of using threatening language towards Lilia Kumuhau. A complaint was sworn out against Genett this morning. Some weeks ago he was arraigned at the police court upon a charge of using language that would fail to pass muster at a social function.
