PANAMA CANAL FUNDS SUPPLIED

Special Commissioner Says Islands Will Produce More Than Enough.

WASHINGTON, April 1.—An initial expenditure of \$2,000,000 for the fortification of the Panama Canal is authorized in the Sundry Civil Act approved March 4, 1911, in the following terms:

"For construction of seacoast batteries on the Canal Zone, two million dollars.

"For the purchase, manufacture and test of seacoast cannon for coast defense, including their carriages, sights, implements, equipments, and the machinery necessary for the manufacture at the arsenals, to cost ultimately not to exceed one million nine hundred and sixty thousand dollars, one million dollars, the same to be immediately available and to continue available until expended."

By recommendation of the Panama Fortification Board, the work on the Isthmus will be done under the direction of the Isthmian Canal Commission. The original estimate for this purpose was \$14,104,203. The estimate sent to Congress on November 1, 1910, provided for an appropriation of \$19,546,843. A report of the fortification board of January 4, 1911, reduces the amount to be appropriated to \$12,475,328.

The estimates on which the initial appropriation was made recommended seacoast armament for the defense of the Canal against naval attack by 14-inch rifles, 6-inch rifles, and 12-inch mortars.
