WORLD SUGAR MARKET

Estimates On Cuban Crop Are Placed Too Low.

Willett & Gray's sugar journal for May 4 says of the raw sugar market: Visible Supply.

Total stock of Europe and America, 3,188,786 tons against 2,967,552 tons last year at the same uneven dates. The increase of stock is 221,234 tons, against an increase of 266,374 last week. Total stocks and affloats together show a visible supply of 3,331,786 tons, against 3,065,552 tons last year, or an increase of 266,234 tons.

Raws.

Quotations for centrifugals have declined .13 cent per lb., from 3.92c. to 3.79c. per lb., 96-degree test, under a moderate business only during the week, the last sale being of 15,000 bags Cubans affloat at 2.7-16c. c. & f. 3.79c. per lb., establishing this spot quotation.

Europe also made an important decline, moving from 10s. 6.3-4d. to 10s. 4.1-2d. to 10s. 5.1-4d., to 10s. 2.1-4d., to 10s. 3.3-4d. at the close. Cane Javas declined 4.1-2d. to 11s. 4.1-2d. No special reason is given for the movements of the week.

A portion of the Arbutle refinery, including the refining machinery building, is incapacitated for work for several months as a result of a fire which occurred on Friday, April 28. The raw sugars held by this refinery have been disposed of, leaving no special influence to the market.

The weekly Cuba cable gave 35,000 tons receipts for six ports and 57,000 tons estimate for entire island. Last week 114 centrals were working and 99 last year.

It has been noted by C. Czarnikow and others that final crop estimates made in April have proved too small, particularly if based on decreased centrals rather than on receipts. Light rains prevailed throughout the island the first part of week under review, but Tuesday's cable reported further rains were needed.

The actual sugar production in Cuba to date as shown by receipts exceeds that of 1909 by about 60,000 tons.

Receipts from now forward will be watched with interest. A further increase of 27,000 tons more over those of 1909 gives a crop of 1,600,000 tons. Generally, however, a falling off in receipts by more rapid closing of centrals is anticipated.

A few small changes appear in our table of crop estimates based on latest information.

We give elsewhere our regular monthly table of stocks in all the principal countries on April 1 (3,202,586 tons against 2,882,559 tons last year and 3,131,308 tons in 1909 at same date), showing increase of 320,027 tons over last year and of 71,178 tons over 1909.

The decrease in stocks Cuba six ports and United States four ports is now 212,766 tons from last year and 148,015 tons less than in 1909 at this date.

The Louisiana cane crop is progressing favorably.

Java reports by mail very favorable crop weather. A large stock of white sugars is being carried over from last crop the principal buyer of which is British India.

India imports continue marked increase.

San Domingo crop is reported decreased by similar conditions as in Cuba.

Philippine Islands exports in April were 8000 tons over April last year, the shipments being 22,000 tons to East Coast United States and 6000 tons to West Coast and 1000 tons elsewhere.

F. O. Licht reports by cable favorable weather for beet crops, and in his monthly (mail advice) circular estimates the increased sowings for all Europe 4.12 per cent., and for Germany 5.49 per cent., Austria 3.1 per cent., Russia 9.33 per cent., and a decrease in France of 3.34 per cent.

Javas are in the market for sale at 10s. 10.1-2d. for June-July and 10s. 7.1-2d. for July-August shipments, but are above buyers' views.

At the close a sale of Porto Ricos at 3.86c. establishes spot quotations at this basis.

ST. LOUIS, Apr. 29.—John Charles Rowe, who will be buried today, was one of America's greatest ball players.

Rowe was a member of the famous "Big Four" composed twenty years ago of Lowe, Dan Brothers, "Deacon Jim" White and Hardie Richardson.

The Big Four belonged to the Buffalo National League Club and when the quartet was transferred to Detroit in 1886 is dropped out of major league ball. Rowe made the All-American team five years—1886-90. Brothers played first, Richardson second, Rowe short and White third. Richardson went to left field when Fred Dunlap joined the Detroit team in 1887.

That year Detroit had the greatest hitting team that ever took the field in baseball, and Rowe was considered the greatest hitter on the team with the exception of Brothers.

Rowe hit as high as 333.

Queen Victoria of Spain, it is reported, will take Prince Jaime, her second son, to Switzerland about the end of June or the beginning of July to undergo an operation to correct a difficulty of speech with which he is affected.
