

Thomas has lived abroad for two years past. Mrs. Thomas sailed for Paris recently, and upon her arrival at Paris, where she registered at another hotel than the one at which her husband was stopping, it leaked out that she contemplated divorce proceedings. Thomas' father was General Sam A. Thomas, who died in 1903, leaving an estate estimated at \$20,000,000. Mrs. Thomas was Linda Lee, a Kentucky belle and an accomplished horsewoman.

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
