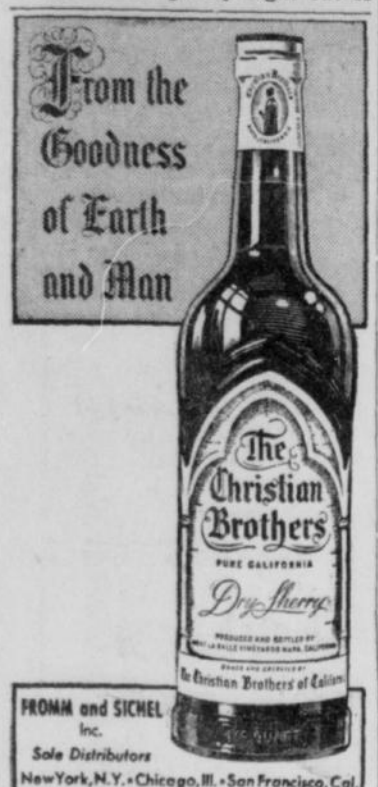


Cage Season Beginning

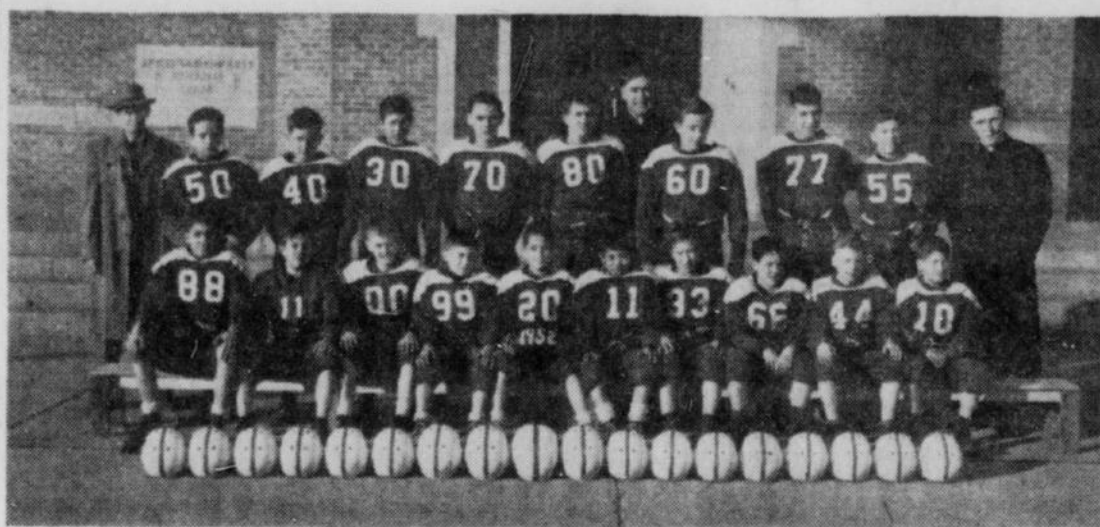

St. James' Squad In Undefeated Season

Basketball Tip-Offs

New Blue Streak Coach Faces Rebuilding Task

With only one regular returning from last year's squad — the sensational junior, Virgil Blakely — Mt. Vernon St. Vincent's new basketball coach Jack Hogan may have a rough time matching last year's 17-6 Blue Streak record.

Hogan, who graduated last June from St. Benedict's college, Atchison, Kan., succeeded his cousin, Ralph Hinger, as coach in September. Hinger resigned to accept a position as counselor of a Chicago community center after coaching the Blue Streaks to 36 wins in 49 starts over a two-year period.

A native of Chicago, the new Mt. Vernon coach attended St. Philip high school where he won four letters in basketball and football and three in baseball. He spent one year at the University of Illinois where he captained the freshman basketball team.

Hogan then moved to St. Benedict's to finish out his college career. At the Kansas college, he garnered three letters in both basketball and baseball and coached the college swimming team.

Blakely, captain of this year's squad, is the key man in Coach Hogan's plans. He poured through 451 points last season in his second year as regular forward. Included in these were 77 foul shots out of 105 attempted, a .733 average.

"The team is developing fairly well but lacks experience," Hogan commented concerning '52-'53 prospects. "Teamed with Blakely at the forward spot will be either Bill Peugh or Paul Heffelfinger, at center will be Allen Weunich, and at the guards will be Bill Peterson and Chuck Flynn.

"The team's shooting percentage is high, but the defensive play can be greatly improved," Hogan continued. "Helping the starting five will be Dave Conking, Jack Farie and Dave Moushey—a promising freshman."

The Streaks beat the Alumni in their opener last week. They're in Columbus tonight (Friday) to meet Holy Family at Aquinas.

New Lexington St. Al
Prospects are bright for another successful season at New Lexington St. Alloysius despite the loss of four lettermen from last year's squad which won 18 out of 21 games in regular season play.

Coach Bob Fowle indicates that the Blue Knights will again have plenty of height under the basket with Bob Sagan and Mike Allen—both well over six feet—being counted upon for plenty of duty.

Coach Fowle is building his fast break offense around senior letterman Dick Dreese. Reserve monogram winners Jack Nash, Neil Fisher, Junior Hatem, Dick Wellenberg and Tony Missimmi will be expected to plug the remaining starting positions.

Regulars on this year's squad will have some pretty big shoes to fill with the departure by graduation of letterman Dave Sorohan, a student of St. Charles college, Paul Wollenberg, Dick Ousley and George Hatem. Sorohan averaged 22 points per game last year leading to Class B All-State honors.

The Blue Knights, now in their fourth year of competition, will again be pointing for the state tournament. For the past three

years, they've advanced to the regional at Athens, losing out to Corning last year 70-69 in the finals.

Three lettermen—two of them starters on last year's team—will provide the nucleus for Coach Ray Robbins' attempts to bring Marion St. Mary another Central Catholic League championship.

Mike Anderson, 5-11 junior who finished second in the St. Mary individual scoring race last year with 261 points, and Dan "Butch" Merchant, 5-5 junior guard who tallied 137 points, are the returning regulars. Senior guard Dave Smith, 5-8, is the third returning letterman.

Six boys up from the reserves and two others who were ineligible last year will fill out the squad. Up from the J-V's are Don Shoemaker, 5-8; Roger Micheli, 5-10; Jack O'Keefe, Pat O'Connor and Larry Ryan, all 5-11; and Jack McNamara, 6-0.

Also being counted upon are Joe Murphy, senior, and Joe Tinnerelli, junior, both of whom stand 6-0 and were ineligible last season.

Major loss from last year's squad—which won 20 of 22 games, capped the CCL title and went to the finals of the District B tournament—was high-scoring forward Dick Gunder. He tallied 452 points last season. Also gone are Jim Finne-gard, 6-1 center; Jim Kilbury, 5-10 guard; and Jasper Tinerello, 6-0 forward.

St. Mary opens the new season next Friday, meeting Carey as part of a double-header at the Marion Coliseum. Second game finds Marion Harding tangling with Willard.

Zanesville Rosecrans
Zanesville Rosecrans announced its 1952-53 team roster this week, with 14 boys—seven seniors, five juniors and two sophomores making up the squad. The seniors are: Gene Nangle, 6-1, forward; Don Ritchey, 6-1, forward; Gene McDaniels, 6-2, center; Joe Allwine, 6-0, center; Harold (Judy) McCarty, 5-11, guard; Hank Weigelt, 5-8, guard; and Kenny Schultze, 5-10, guard.

Juniors are Tom Bramlish, 5-11, forward; Phil Dinan, 5-11, forward; Curtis Soulesy, 6-0, forward; Jerry Hunt, 6-1, center; and Jerry Cooper, 5-9, guard. Jim Duhan, 6-1, forward and Chuck Mattingly, 5-9, both sophomores, round out the squad.

The Bishops, who meet St. Charles Dec. 5, in Columbus, are again under the tutelage of Muskingum grad Dick Mattingly, who has rung up an outstanding record since the school was formed two years ago. Since that time, Rosecrans' squads have won 32 out of 43 starts.

Last year, the Bishops captured the sectional tournament with three straight wins and moved to the finals of the district tourney before losing to New Matamoras—which went to the state finals in Columbus.

On the Ball—Three Ohio Teams Ranked Among Catholic Top Ten

On the basis of their records, three teams have dominated Catholic college football play this fall with several others following closely in runner-up positions.

As usual, it is somewhat risky to attempt to compile our annual rating of the 10 best Catholic teams, but the assignment is ours and we will follow through with it. According to custom, we eliminate our own Marquette squad from consideration.

No one will be surprised to find Notre Dame again at the head of the list. We must admit, however, that the Irish got there the hard way. After tying one, winning one and losing one in its first three games, Notre Dame was regarded only mildly. But the Irish captured the fancy of the nation as the season progressed, and were simply terrific as they performed before uncounted millions in their television triumph over rugged Oklahoma.

Winning habits also were the rule at Villanova and Holy Cross, which have turned in splendid records. Almost all the other majors showed improvement except Santa Clara, lone Catholic representative on the west coast, which ran into miserable luck with injuries and slipped somewhat badly.
