

On September 30th, 1897, St. Therese of the Child Jesus entered Heaven to receive the Crown of Imperishable Glory. St. Therese died at the age of 24, in the Carmelite cloister of Lisieux, France, after eighteen months suffering with tuberculosis. She was canonized in 1925, only 28 years after death, and is survived by an 86-year-old sister, Sr. Genevieve, who is also a nun at Lisieux.

**If They Get Story of Davy
They Can Get Story of Christ**

NEW YORK — (NC) — If the story of Davy Crockett can get across to a child of three or four years, the youngster is not too young to understand the story of Christ's birth and many Church teachings, a Redemptorist priest said here in a radio broadcast.

Speaking on "The Catholic Hour", Father John Schultz, C.S.S.R., of Holy Redeemer College, Washington, D.C., said that parents often underestimate the intelligence of little children and avoid starting them on the teachings of their faith because they are assumed to be too young. The success of Davy Crockett disproves this, he stated.

Urging short night and morning prayers for children, the priest struck out at those parents who think the religious education of their children can be taken care of in school.

"It is too late to begin religious education when they get to school," he said flatly.

The school is a help, he continued, but the first obligation of educating children in religion is the parents. "Children must learn to think and act correctly in the home," he emphasized.

NEW HAVEN, Conn. — (NC) — Action taken by Luke E. Hart, Supreme Knight of the Knights of Columbus, has helped influence the U.S. Information Agency, Washington, D.C., to place copies of Dr. James M. O'Neill's book, "Catholicism and American Freedom," in libraries at its overseas information centers, it was disclosed at K. of C. headquarters here.

Dr. O'Neill's book is widely recognized and accepted as an answer to Jaul Blanshard's attack on the Catholic Church in his book, "American Freedom and Catholic Power," which is provided in the agency's overseas libraries.
