made certain remarks about the band-veteran of last season. The existing situation has developed from the fact that Peterson has been out of the game with an attack of "flu." He is now convalescent, however, and is expected to give a big lift in the several big games now confronting the team before the West Point regatta. The middies are not only counting on taming the Soldiers when they clash on the Plains up the Hudson, June 2, but here will also be an inter-service field and track meet and tennis match on the same date, and they have high hopes of registering a triple victory. They feel that such a triumph would, in a way, offset the defeat on the gridiron last fall. The field and track contest between the rival students promises to be a corker, as Army is reported to have excellent representatives in the hurdles and weight events, two lines in which the middies have outshone other rivals this season. Dabiez, star center of the Army basketball team last fall, has been putting the shot well over 40 feet, better than Carney or any other Navy man has done this season.

**Stiekmen To Meet Syracuse**  
The middies' lacrosse team is now rounding out another wonderful season, their seventh, without suffering defeat. The climax of their campaign will come next Saturday when they face Syracuse, the only team they did not meet last year, although championship laurels were practically complete without a victory over the Orange. The coming game will be played at Syracuse.

With the varsity and second varsity crews meeting Syracuse crews on the Severn, and the Navy-Syracuse lacrosse game away, and the baseball team also playing on foreign soils, meeting the University of Pennsylvania, the middies will stage three other events under home environments next Saturday. The card will be: Field and track with Georgetown; tennis with University of Michigan, and rifle shooting with the Quantico Marines.

The coming Wednesday the middies will engage in one of the biggest local ball games, playing Georgetown. The same day the tennis team will meet Lafayette.

master, Henry J. Peterman, to the effect that they would give \$5 to have him "knocked off." These alleged remarks were made one day last month near the Naval Academy armory, and while Mr. Peterman's section of the band was being rehearsed on the field. The bandmen all denied having made the remarks attributed to them, and it was further shown that all that was said on that particular occasion was done in a more or less casual and joking manner.

**Others Involved In Probe**  
Also involved in the investigation were Bandsmen Charles Ceska and Ernest DeSantis, but the cases against these two were of a far less serious nature, and their exhortation was said to have been apparent from the beginning.

Now that the investigation is over and the men restored to duty, the atmosphere among members of the band is said to have been cleared up considerably, and that a better understanding prevails all around.

Although no official announcement on the subject has been made, it is understood that the board's investigation disclosed certain conditions apart from the band itself that will likely be the subject of a thorough probe in the near future, and which will affect other service units within the Naval Academy.
