We had the pleasure of being present and listening to the exercises of the occasion. The weather on both days was delightful. The dust had been laid by a refreshing shower in the early part of the week, and the atmosphere was cool and invigorating. The attendance upon both days was very large, especially the last. Distinguished gentlemen ids of the school were there from all

In the afternoon of Wednesday, the Prize Declamation and Reading came off. The speaking by the gentleman and reading by the ladies were highly creditable to both sexes. Seventeen young men and afteen young ladies competed for the prizes. All performed their several parts well, and it was with much difficulty that the compiliers could decide the culty that the committees could decide be-tween the comparative merits of some half dozen among the number who declaimed and read. Among the best speakers may be set down Brooks of Augusta, Sanderson of Farmington, Chase of Paris, Josselyn of Phil-Farmington, Chase of Paris, Josselyn of Phillips, Abbott of Auburndale, Mass., and Sewall. of Mobile, Ala. The prize, (a copy of Shakspeare beautifully bound) was awarded to Sanderson. Among the best readers were Louise F. Allen of Wilton, Alice M. White of Buckfield, Emily E. Beedy of Farmington, Annie F. and Millie M. Cox of Pittston, the two Misses Allen of Readfield, and Emma F. Spaulding of Buckfield. The prize was awarded to Annie F. Cox of Pittston, an amiable little girl of fourteen years of age. In the evening there was a crowded levee at the college building.

Lieutenant General Pemberton was born in at the commencement of the rebellion was an officer in the Federal army on the frontier, in command of two companies of artillery. His command was ordered to Washington, and reached Baltimore during the time the rio was in progress. Pemberton resigned his position, and then went to Richmond and ten-dered his services to President Davis, was acdered his services to President Davis, was accepted, and given the command of a regiment of cavalry. He was afterwards made a brigadier and send to the Department of South Carolina. No one ever heard that he accomplished any brilliant deeds in that department, but he was an especial pet of Davis, and was soon after made a major general. After a short time he was sent to the Department of Mississippi and East Louisiana, and promoted to a lieutenant generalcy.

a lieutenant generalcy. Socially Gen. Pemberton is a brute. If you bave business of a military character he is approachable, but not otherwise. He dresses plainly, and his personal carriage is stiff and ungraceful. In temper he is brutal and unmanageable, continually in a quarrel with his adjutant and staff. Soldiers and citizens are displaced with him both socials and account of the socials and citizens are spleased with him, both socially and as a litary chieftain, and demand his transfer military chieftain, and demand his transfer to some other department. The War Department at Richmond have unlimited confidence in him, however, and there is no prospect of a change. The President, in his address to the faithful at Jackson, some time ago, spoke in extravagant terms of him as a military man, and advised hearty acquiescence in all his plans.

His personal characteristics are, height five feet ten inches; eyes, dark gray; nose, keen, sharp, and straight; voice, coarse and rough, speaks quickly, and plumes himself upon his dignity; is reserved in his manner; believes in Gen. Pemberton, and don't care a rush for while coincien.

Gen. Loring is a native of Mississippi, and is considered one of the best officers in the Southern army. He lost an arm in the Mex-ican war. His personal characteristics are

those of a gentleman, treats everybody with profound respect, and espouses the cause of the rebels because he believes it just. He is five feet nine inches high, dresses magnificently, and aims to secure the confidence of his men. He is a jovial, good-hearted fellow, and worthy of a better cause. He was recently in command at Greenwood, where the Federal troops were repulsed, and is now in the vicinity of Vicksburg.

Brig. Gen. C. D. Lee is a South Carolinian,

and when he became a rebel was a first lieu-tenant in the Federal army. He graduated at West Point, and bears the reputation of an excellent soldier. This officer commands the Vicksburg batteries, and all the artillery in the district of Vicksburg. It is said that he was so indignant at the recent running of the blockade by the transports and gunboats, that he sent all the gunners with their officers in

Gen. Lee dresses plainly, and acts the gent-leman. Jeff. Davis believes in Lee, and as-cribes to him the possession of extraordinary military genius. His conduct in the battle of Chickasaw Bayon is highly commended. Gen. Lee is considered one of the rising men of the Confederacy.

The report in circulation that on and after July 1st all letters deposited in the post office for mailing, on which the postage is short, instead of being sent forward, as now, will be kept and treated as if there upon stamps on them, is not true. AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING SIDEWALKS
AND FOOTWAYS. AND FOOTWAYS.

Be it ordained by the Mayor. Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of Portland, in City Council assembled, as follows:

CECTION 1. Whenever the City Council may require the sidewalk or footway in front of any lot of ground, fronting on any street or way, in the city of Portland, to be paved, it shall be the duty of the Commissioner of Streets to notify the owner or tenant of said lot, in writing, of such requirement, and if the owner of such lot shall refuse, or neglect to pave the same as aforesaid, to the satisfaction and approval of the Committee on Streets, for the space of twenty days after notice as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of said Commissioner to pave such sidewalk or footway in such manner as said Committee may direct.

or lootway in such manner as said Committee may direct.

SECT. 2. The City Council shall assume one half part of the cost or expense of paving the sidewalks or footways of the streets of said city, as proyided for in the preceding section, said cost or expense to be estimated and determined by the Committee on Streets; and the city will cause said proportion of the cost or expense of said sidewalk or footway to be paid in money or materials, as the Committee on Streets shall determine and elect.

SECT. 3. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed; and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the Mayor.
