Letter from the Army of the Potomac. RAPPAHANNOCK STATION, VA., August 17th, 1863. To the Editor of the Press:

The weekly visits of the "Press" make me feel as if much nearer Portland than I really am. The visit of our Western friends, the

am. The visit of our Western friends, the great meeting of the true men of Portland to hear Gen. Shepley, are matters which many of us in the army feel a deep interest in. We are now keeping as quiet as this very hot weather will allow. I never saw anything quite equal to this for heat.

The drafted men are coming in. Stragglers are returning, and some who were taken prisoners at Gettysburg have returned, and our ranks begin to have the appearance of former days. Do not for a moment suppose we are idle, for this army is very far from that. The 1st Army Corps, now commanded by Maj. Gen. John Newton, is at this place, on both sides of the Rappahannock river. We have a strong position and can hold it just as long as we wish to do so.

We now occupy ground almost sacred in the history of this war. Here was quite a battle between "Stonewall Jackson" and our army under Gen. Pope. Gen. Banks was encamped in a beautiful oak wood here, but the rebels getting a battery in range on a hill on the other side of the river, soon compelled our troops to fall back towards Bealton. The Railroad bridge over the Rappahannock was destroyed, but was rebuilt last week in the short space of two days, and this a bridge of 250 feet in length, and our cars are now runshort space of two days, and this a bridge of 250 feet in length, and our ears are now running to the South side of the river. We see all around here the great destruction which has taken have been the large hard where the armies have been the large hard where the large hard where the same this was quite a village. us plainly that once this was quite a village,

and now not a family remains here.

Any one has only to ride on the cars from Fairfax Station to Manassas Junction and so on to Carthletts and all the way to Warrenton Junction to see the wreck of cars and all the apparatus for doing a railroad business in one common mass of destruction. The whole distance of 25 miles you will see strown on either side of the road car wheels, whole truck frames, broken engines, smashed up cars and the half buried remains of those loaded with Quartermaster and Commissary stores, which were burned on Pope's retreat. The few inhabitants who remain are sick at heart of their folly, and all whom I have seen wish themselves out of this, "the worst fix they were ever in," as one expressed it to me the other day. Not-withstanding the hard fighting and long marches we have had, we are ready to move marches we have had, we are ready to move forward at an hour's notice. We have confidence in Gen. Meade and believe he will yet lead us on to greater victory. There are many things we love—our friends at home, our dear old flag, a brave and true man, &c., and some few things we hate; and among them our enemies at home. We do from the bottom of our heart hate (that word don't expressed to the state of the bottom of our heart hate (that word don't express it) despise, loathe those beings, (not men) who are seeking to counteract our efforts to put dewn this ungodly rebellion; and while we feel anxious to see this war closed that we may be at home once more with loved ones, we also feel that we have an account to settle at the ballot box with the traitors at home. We have a thousand times more regard for the prisoners we take from the rebel army than for the miserable sneaks North.

Look out, Mr. Copperhead, the day of judgment will soon be upon you and no space left you for repentance.

A sad accident occurred here yesterday.

Charles Small, a Sergeant of Co. C, 16th regiment, was drowned here, while bathing in the river. Sergeant Small was from Wilton, Me., where his parents reside. He was a very fine young man, and few had more personal friends than he. No less than eight have been drown-ed in the river at this place since we came here two weeks ago. Sergeant Small's funeral was attended at five o'clock on Sunday, P. al was attended at five o'clock on Sunday, P.

M. Religious service was suspended in the other regiments and all attended this service which was conducted by Rev. George Bullin, chaplain of the 16th regiment, assisted by Chaplain Cook of the 94th New York and Chaplain Ward of the 104th New York.

The 16th regiment Maine Vols. is the only Maine regiment in this whole Corps, while the 3d Corps and some others have as many as three or four Maine regiments each.

Stops and Marks-No. 6. "BEEF SLOUGH," UPPER MISSISSIPPI, Aug. 12.

We transferred ourselves at 10 o'clock last evening to the smaller steamer, Jeanette Roberts, and were presently oblivious to all the beauties of nature, which our route might have disclosed by daylight. An extra motion and commotion, with louder puffing of our high pressure engine, waked us occasionally, to remind passengers that we were hanging up on a sand bar. Soon after daylight we discover ahead two boats fast aground, and another just pressing on toward the same shoal or slough (pronounced sloe). She too grounds. The anxious question with us is, whether we shall share the same fate. Our pilot proving more skilful, or our boat of lighter draft, we shoot past them without grounding, and with three cheers for the pilot, and a wave of kerchiefs to the sad-looking people on the boats which we leave behind, we pass "Beef Slough" with great pleasure and soon make a landing at Wabashaw, a smart little town on the Minnesota shore, situated on the river bottom, under the hills.

"Storage, Forwarding and Commission" is is the sign on nearly all the business houses on the river. The wheat from the back-lying farms is brought in to these landings for ship ment, and the business of transportation is transacted by agents or merchants under these signs. The wheat is transported in sacks, or in bulk, in light, clean barges, from which it is raised into the elevators at Dunleith, Dubuque or elsewhere. We haul up at the entrance to Lake Pepin to repair our little stern-wheel, which has taken a lee lurch, in virtue of contact with some snag or other obstruction. Near this point comes in the Chippewa river on our right. Large rafts of Wisconsin tim-ber—in the log. Large cranes are flopping

about the sand bars, with their awkward legs

about the sand bars, with their awkward legs dragging and dangling like a boy's arm at his first declamation. A turkey-buzzard wheels away in the distance, and a white crane is pointed out as a rarity;—rara axis in gurgite vasto. Immense bass or other fish leap from the river as we pass, to remind us of fresh fish for dinner. And so here we enter Lake Pepin. Let us go up to the pilot house to observe.

Magnificent! The bottom lands are gone down out of sight; and wide across from bluff to bluff, some four or five miles, the waters spread into a lake-like expanse, said to be in many parts without fathomable bottom, and thirty miles long. Half way up the lake is a bold headland called Lover's Leap. Lake City on the opposite shore is a place of considerable pretensions, where we land and take a mail, drop a few passengers, and then push siderable pretensions, where we land and take a mail, drop a few passengers, and then push on across the remaining half of the lake. The difficulties of steering for a while disappear, and a green hand from Maine is allowed to relieve the pilot, for an hour, while the said pilot instructs a Scotch lady in the legends and history of the various points which we pass. The lady in question has traveled much in Europe and entertains us with her observations upon the people and the lands she has seen abroad.

We are over the lake, and by a very narrow passage again wind into the river proper, with

We are over the lake, and by a very narrow passage again wind into the river proper, with high lands on one side and low wooded islands the other. Here innumerable snags are born. The low lands are washed away, and the trees that grew upon them fall into the river, to be carried into the channels and anchored by their roots, to ensnare some ill-fated boat. We passed two or three wrecks yesterday, which have been sacrificed in this way, within a short time. short time.

Ordinance of the City respecting Ordinance of the City respecting Dogs.

SECT. 1.—No dog shall be permitted to go at large or loose, in any street, lane, alley, court, or traveled way, or in any uninclosed or public place in this City, until the owner or keeper of such dog, or the head of the family, or the keeper of the house, store, shop, office, or other place where such dog is kept or harbored, shall have paid to the City Marshal two dollars for a license for such dog to go at large.

SECT. In case any dog shall be found loose, or going at large, contrary to any of the foregoing provisions, the owner or keeper thereof, or the head of the family, or keeper of the house, store, shop, office, or other place where such dog is kept or harbored, shall forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding ten dollars.

City Ordinance respecting Health
SECT. 18.—If any person shall erect, place or continue any hog-sty within one bundred feet of any street, square, lane or alley, or of any dwelling house, such person shall forfeit and pay for every such offence, the sum of five dollars, and the further sum of five dollars for every week during which any hog or swine shall be kept or continued in such sty.

SECT. 19.—All house offal, whether consisting of animal or vegetable substances, shall be deposited in convenient vessels, and be kept in some convenient place, to be taken away by such person or persons as shall be appointed by the Mayor and Aldermen for that purpose.

SECT. 29.—A city cart, or other suitable vehicle, shall be provided, and turnished with a bell to give notice of its approach, which shall pass through all the streets, lanes and courts of the city, as often as twice in every week, to receive and carry away all such house offal as may have been accumulated in in the vessels aforesaid.

SECT. 22.—All persons shall promptly deliver the offal so accumulated on the premises to the person appointed as aforesaid to receive the same; and if any person shall neglect to provide suitable vessels for the deposit of such house offal, or shall in any way hinder or delay the person so appointed to receive ti, in the performance of his duty atoresaid, he shall forfeit and pay a sum not less than two, nor more than twenty dollars, for each and every offence.

SECT. 23.—No person shall go about collecting any house offal, consisting of animal or vegetable sub-

fence.

SECT. 23.—No person shall go about collecting any house offal, consisting of animal or vegetable substances, or carry the same through any of the streets, lanes or courts of the city, except the person appointed as aforesaid, or his de uty, under a penalty of not less than two nor more than twenty dollars, for each and every offence.
