An unseen power is manifestly guiding many minds; and it is equally resistless and satisfying. It cannot be doubted that the Spirit o God is operating in a very especial manner upon the hearts of those who have hitherto been strangers to His power-dead in tress passes and sins. It is not mere emotion-ecstatic joy-religious frenzy; it is a calm, settled purpose to forsake sin, not so much to avoid its evitable penalty, as because in itself and in the sight of God it is odious; and to secure holiness, not alone that happiness may ensue, but because in itself it is right and pleasing to

A promising feature of the work, as it is : sure pledge of success, is a delightful union among all Christians. Mere sectarianism for the time at least-would it were for all time-is wholly banished. The only question seems to be, What can I do to save others from sin? or, How shall I be delivered from its power? And the only remedy proposed is, Believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved; while the only cry of the penitent is, "Lord, I believe, help thou my unbelief." Sin is confusion, complication, despair, death, but the remedy is perfectly simple and sure-only believe. Meetings are now held every evening in the Congregational church, and are under the joint direction of Rev. Mr. Danielson of that church, and Rev. Mr. Pottle of the Methodist church. And whatever the weather the house is crowded, not the slightest disturbance oc curs, and none leave until the close of services. As many as one hundred and fifty have risen for prayers, and from seventy to eighty have expressed a hope that God has pardoned their sins. Included in the latter are quite a number of the most active business men of the fulness of the churches.

Will not the desire arise, and shall not pray er ascend, that the power now operating may increase and extend until the entire village shall become its willing subjects, and the place be disenthralled and redeemed from sin? .

PAVING Streets.

PORTLAND, May 18, 1867.

Mr. EDITOR:—I see by your Wednesday's paper that an order has been issued by your City Council, for the pavement of certain streets, and as the useful and ornamental should go together, permit me to offer through your paper a few practical remarks on the pavement of streets.

Your city is one of the most beautiful and healthy in the State, and it would be a pity to marr it with unsightly roads.

marr it with unsightly roads.

The first thing to be taken into consideration in making new streets is the drainage. Streets thoroughly drained are half paved; and to do this effectually, requires a deep, wide drain on each side, or one much larger, in the centre, with smaller ones running from each side, having grates to carry off the surface water to the main. ace water to the main.

Secondly, dig out from two to three feet of arth, according to the quality of the land, selow the level of the street, and fill up with below the level of the street, and in the with loose stones set edgways, crossing the street to the main sewers or drains—large stones in the bottom and smaller to the bed of your pavement—and a foundation thus laid will re-sist the action of the severest frost, and your

sist the action of the severest frost, and your pavement will be secure.

Thirdly, set all your streets with square stone, say nine to ten inches deep, four to six inches thick, twelve to fourteen inches long, running from side to side within ten or twelve inches of the curb or edge stones that support the walks; fill up the space on each side with the same kind of stone set lengthwise, or with a broader stone set an inch lower than the pavement, and four to five inches lower than the walks; then you will have a road worthy. the walks; then you will have a road worthy of the splendid architecture that is gracing those streets, which will last if well done, from

You have all the material at hand on every You have all the material at hand on every side, and the expense will be far less than paving with rounded pebbles from the ocean shore. The best stone for such an undertak-ing may be found by the track of the Grand Trunk, and below the depot, facing the bay, and much of it carved by nature for the pur-lesses named; and the cost in your case would poses named; and the cost in your case would be but a trifle compared with its use. > Masonic.-The two divisions of the Supreme Council, Thirty-third Degree, Freemasons which have been in session in Boston since Wednesday last, succeeded on Friday in bringing about a reconciliation or adjustment of lifficulties which have existed for a period of fifty-three years, the schism having originated as early as 1814. In 1860 the troubles had eached a point which threatened to seriously injure the great Order. The two Supreme Councils were united upon terms which are entirely satisfactory, and the following officers for the new Council were elected-to hold their respective offices for three years:

Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldormen, and Common Council of the City of Portland, in City Council assembled, as follows:

Be it ordined by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of Portland, in City Council execution as follows:

CECTION 1. The Revised Ordinance concerning Streets is hereby amended by adding the following clause to Section 38 of said Ordinance, to wit.:—And if any persons shall be found standing in groups of three or more persons, on any sidewalk or cress walk, or on any street or public way in this City, after having been once directed to pass on by the Mayor, one Alderman, City Marshal or Deputy, or any Policeman, Constable or Watchman, he shall be liable to a fine of not less than five nor more than Policeman, Constable or Watchman, he shall be liable to a fire of not less than five nor more than twenty dollsas for each offence.

SMOT. 2. This Ordinance shall be in force after its approved by the Mayor.
