A state of siege has been declared in all the provinces in consequence of anticipated insurrectionary movements. LONDON, Aug. 24. The U. S. ship of war Minnesota has gone to Cherbourg.

The Salzburg Conference continues to engress a large share of public attention.

It is rumored to-day that an explicit understanding has been arrived at between their Imperial Majesties, Napoleon and Francis Joseph, not only in regard to the formation of a Southern German Confederation, but also to resist any intervention in the Eastern question. It was also agreed that the States forming South Germany should remain in Zollverein so long as Prussia abides by the treaty of Prague. In regard to Schleswig it was proposed that his Majesty Francis Joseph should interpose his good offices, and that on the other hand Denmark should make considerable concessions in her demand.

The Mexican question also came up for consideration. The body of the Arch Duke Maximilian is to be demanded from the Mexicans by both France and Austria, and the citizens of both Empires in Mexico, are to be protected at all hazards.
