

FLORIDA'S WAR CASUALTIES

The Navy Department announced for the United States as a whole 417 casualties for June 14, 1945, of the U. S. Naval Forces (Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard) not heretofore released on Navy Department total casualty lists, consisting of 109 dead, 264 wounded, and 44 missing. These casualties bring the total reported to next of kin and released for publication since December 7, 1941, to June 14, 1945, to 117,326.

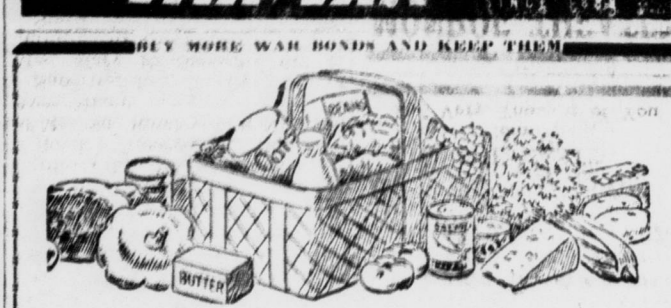
