Browne, did not record the deed.

And after the judge died, Mr. Malone, according to information given The Citizen today, forgot to record the deed.

Shortly after Mr. Malone's death last year, Mrs. Malone, in searching through his legal papers, found the deed to the Browne property. She showed it to her attorney, County Judge Raymond R. Lord, and the deed was recorded.

The amount involved was \$1,600, plus interest for 10 years, but Mrs. Rosetta May Malone, Mr. Malone's widow, has given a deed to the property to Mrs. Bush for \$1,500, and the latter now is negotiating to sell the property.

One parcel has a frontage of 99 feet on Palm Avenue and runs back 180 feet to Pearl street. The other plot, off Angela street, where it joins Palm avenue, has a frontage on the Garrison Right, with riparian rights, of 124.6 feet.
