Chairmen of the standing committees reported on planning sessions held with their committee members and projects for the coming sorority year were discussed under the heading of new business.

Mrs. Jeff Knight, chairman of the service committee, introduced several service projects for consideration by the chapter.

The members, by unanimous vote, chose as one of their projects the purchase of a resuscitator for newborn infants to be presented to the Monroe General Hospital for use in the maternity ward.


