Money Matters in the East.

TROY, Nov. 14, 1857.

I am happy to assure you that the condition of affairs at the east is decidedly improving. The steamer "Arabia" arrived at New York yesterday bringing intelligence of the fall of "Delhi." She brought about one million of specie. News had been re-ceived in England of the general suspension of the New York banks. So far from exciting any disturbance or alarm in financial circles, the English press speak of the "suspension" as the most favorable event that could have been expected. They say truly, that had the banks "suspended" two or three weeks earlier, that an immense amount of distress and ruin would have been prevented. They had encouraged the commercial community to rely upon them for extraordinary assistance, and freely expanded in loans and discounts. Suddenly they took fright, and an unprecedented and fearful contraction was the result. The strongest houses, unable to stem the storm, trembled like reeds, and many of them were forced by the selfish and criminal policy of the banks, to succumb to the pressure of the times. Unable to realize from their assets, however large, it was impossible for them in many cases, to meet their liabilities, however small, Thus universal ruin set in like a flood, and trict. universal distrust took the place of urive sal confidence. The panks, in the pride of an egregious

selfishness, determined to weather the storm. though every commercial house should fall. But they reasoned without their host! The great public took the matter into its own hands, and compelled these despotic institutions to suspend. Then the banks and their victims were reduced to a common level. der was received at that office extending the This event constituted the crisis of the storm, the consequences of which, however, are not yet over. Confidence is said to be a " plant of slow growth;" when once shaken, it cannot be restored in a moment, we must have patience and trust to time. Everywhere we cast our eyes, we see the sad results of the temptest which has swept so fearfully over the land. Trade has been prostrated in every section of our immense country, manufacturing industry is without employment, and the poor workmen know not what to do. These sons of honest labor, with stout hearts and strong arms-anxious to work, can find no one to employ them, with winter and hunger staring them in the face, their condition appeals with the greatest force, to the sympathies of every heart. What can these people do? With every assistance that can be rendered by corporations or by private sympathy, still great and terrible suffering must ensue, when the cold of winter begins to numb the limbs of the naked, and starvation to gnaw the stomachs of the hungry. What a terrible commentary is this state of things upon our currency system. The wrong must be there, -it can be no where else, for as every one admits, the country never was so productive, or rich in real wealth, as it is at the present time. That which represents wealth, has been mistaken for the thing itself, when it is but its shadow. An excessive supply of money, as a natural consequence produces expansion with all its dangers. Contraction then takes place, just as naturally, and money and credit disappear together. Such powers of expansion and contraction, should not be permitted to exist, and this is the great argument against banks of issue. If they have these powers, they should be so regulated by wise legislative action, that sudden contractions could not occur,- Then there would be no panies! I look forward with exceeding interest to the proceedings of our next Legislature. It is to be hoped that active measures will pred laborers. We abound with uncultrea-ted lands. Put the labor upon the land, and wealth, to the individual and the State, will be the sure results. Have we not too much depended upon the sickly aid of Eastern capital, and flittered it away whom he had ever found aiding and assisting aid of Eastern capital, and flittered it away in wild speculations, when it would have been better for us to have invested it in cultivated lands, which would have repaid us better in the end and have saved us, perhaps from debt and ruin

If Minnesota is to become a great and wealthy State, its wealth and power must come from home-not from abroad. She has as fine lands as there are in the world. She has vast prairies and valuable mines-what she wants, is labor-strong, physical, productive labor! Let us encourage labor and surround it with security and dignity-it is our only hope! Nothing but this can enable Minnesota to fulfil the bright destiny which we believe to be in store for her !

To Emigrants and Pre-emptors.

To the Editors of the Pioneer and Democrat.

I notice quite a number of articles published in the papers, purporting to give information on the subject of pre-emptions. some of which purport to be signed by the Commissioners of the General Land Office and some not, but all purport to be copied from some of his letters, and thus bear a emi-official character.

It would be difficult for any man, however intelligent, to understand the rights of individuals from a perusal of such articles. Having a day's leisure at Minneapolis I

made some enquiries in regard to pre-emptions in that office, and propose to give you the result of my enquiries:

The order withdrawing lands from market embraced all the land in the district east of range 32, except four towns directly west of Hutchinson viz: 116 and 117 R, 30 and 31, and no others, and bears date by telegraph, March 7th, and by mail, April 9th, 1857. and was designed to protect the companies from ordinary sale, or location, by private entry, and as none can be thus entered, except after having been offered at a public sale and remain unsold; consequently there are no lands in the district subject to private e try; and therefore the said order was practically, at that time, inoperative in that dis-

On the 30th of June, an order was received at that office prohibiting any filings on daims (predicated on a settlement made after the receipts of said order.) on any of the lands withdrawn from market by the order of March 7th, 1857, "for the period of 4 months," which said four months expired on the evening of the 30th of October.

On the second of September another or operations of the one of June 30th, over the entire district, until the said 30th of Octo-

The order of withdrawal of the 7th of March, and the 7th of April, contains the following explanatory remark, the whole of which I have not yet seen in print, viz :

"But it will be observed that the act of Congress recognizes pre-emption claims upon settlements made up to the time 'when the lines or routes of said roads and branches are definitely fixed that is, by the decision of the late Attorney General, until the lines of the roads, or any parts of them, are surveyed, marked, and fixed on the ground. The evidence of surveying and marking the different sections of the roads will be required to be filed in the district offices, at the proper time, as the surveys progress, therefore pre-emption claims, based upon settlements made up to that time." (i. e. surveying, marking and fixing the line, and filing in the local office the evidence thereof, as the same progresses,) "on any of the lands withdrawn, whether offered or unoffered, surveyed or unsurveyed, will be allowed by you, if right in all other respects."

The order of the 30th of June had the effect only to stop the operation of the above instructions for the period of four months next thereafter.

The orders of June 30th and September 2d, having both spent their force on the 30th of October, the order of withdrawal of the 7th of March is restored to its origi, nal footing.

The above constituting all of the instructions in the Minneapolis office, it will be difficult to see how emigrants can be prohibited from making settlements after 30th Oct. until the roads file some evidence in the local office of a survey, marking and fixing, &c. as provided in the instructions, and that the same should be pre-empted on odd or even sections at \$1 25 per acre.
