DIED.—We are pained to announce the death of Gen. S. B. Lowry this morning at about six o'clock, at his farm residence one mile above town. We are informed by a person present that he arose in his usual health this morning, and was sitting by the stove awaiting the sleigh to take him, as was his daily custom, to his office in town, when all of a sudden his wife observed him fainting, and called for the assistance of Mr. Green who was living in the house with them, who immediately came and placing his arm around him, supported him in his chair, and sprinkled cold water on his head and face; but with two gasps life was extinct. It appears that for some time past the General has been greatly afflicted with the disease of the heart, which was no doubt the immediate cause of his death.
