The following is from the editorial page of the Chicago Journal of the 20th inst.:

"The flood of immigration to the Indian Territory would almost remind one of the period of '49. It is a great country, and the people of that territory assert that only statehood is needed to make it take rank with the best."

"Somebody wants to know what is the chance for a young man in the territory."

"The answer is, first-class, if he is the right kind of a young man."

"A doctor, lawyer or merchant coming to any one of the larger cities will find the field well occupied. The weak will surrender. The strong will fight. To the weak-hearted the territory men say:

"You have competition here, of course, but you have the finest opportunity in the world. You had competition at home; and that, too, of the hardest kind. In the states your profession and your business enterprises are, for the most part, in the hands of men who have been long established; who have the advantage of wealth and family influence. You had to meet a competitor strongly entrenched. Here is a fight in the open. Men on the ground here have only a few years the start of you. In new communities to be established you may be among the first on the ground. Strangers coming in can not go to the old family doctor, or lawyer, or merchant. They must look about them without prejudice to get the best of service or of goods. Your salvation is in your own hands. In ten years the population will be nearly doubled. If you want opportunity you will find it here."

"There are no drawbacks that can prevent a swift and steady growth of the Territory. With its rich agricultural and mineral resources, it is certain soon to become one of the most prosperous sections of the country."
