THE LATE FIRES AT MAKAWAO.-A local paper tates in its just issue, that it has the authority of a gentleman recently from Makawao, that it is the opinion of the proprietor of the Hobron plantation lately has started everything growing in the finest that the Boiling House was accidentally set on fire style. The various crops in that district look green from the tobacco or uplum pipe of the Chinese and flourishing, and the people anticipate abundant watchman on guard. This is a very fair story, but it will hardly be credited when we state upon the authority of Marshal Parke, who has recently visited the scene of the fire, that there was no Chinese watchman on the place at all, and that the propriefor has not the slightest idea that the building was fired accidentally. No watchman whatever was em-

ployed about the place, although a Chinaman slept in the boiling house, using a spare iron coole some two feet deep, in which he had his mats, for a bedatead. He may or may not have smoked tobacco or oplum in his bed, but no one unless it be the gentleman from Maul, and of course his triends of the Advertiser, supposes that the cooler took fire and communicated the flames to the building. The circumstances of the fire were as follows: The China man who slept in the Bolling House was in the habit of getting up at four o'clock and calling the firemen to light the fires under the boilers, in order that work might commence at five o'clock. On the morning of the fire, he was on his way to the quarters of the firemen, when he saw the fire on the roof of the drying house, which is attached to the boiling bouse. He immediately rushed to the bell and commenced ringing it violently. Others saw the fire about the same time the Chinaman did, and confirm his statement in every respect, the fact be ing also stated, that the fire was first discovered the roof of the drying house some twenty five feet from where the man sient and where he had just

left. The supposition is that the place was wilfully set on fire by some person who took some dry trash, which was lying near the place, and placing it on the roof ignited it with a match, during the time the Chineman was on his way to the house where the firemen were sleeping. A man has been arrested for setting fire to the

coper shop and trash house. He was brought to Honolulu by Marshal Parke on Sunday morning, and is now to prison awaiting trial.
