BURLINGTON M. E. CHURCH.—Last Sabbath was an occasion of more than common interest in the M. E. congregation, worshipping in Ebenezer Church.—Rev. E. A. Waring, the Pastor, who is about to close his second year of service in this station, preached a discourse adapted to the occasion from I Samuel, 12: 23-28, after which thirty-two persons were received into full communion with the Church, after the beautiful form prescribed by the last General Conference for that purpose. It is not often that a more interesting company of persons are admitted into church fellowship. We are informed by the Pastor that the Church now numbers about 313 members, and over fifty probationers. Last year the number was 275 members and nine probationers, showing a large aggregate increase for the year over all losses by removals, &c. Two valuable members, Mrs. R. H. Williams, one of the first members in Burlington, and Mrs. Anna C. Ripley have died during the Conference year. We understand it is in contemplation to have two preachers after the conference.—[Hawkeye.]

THE UNION PRISONERS AT CHARLESTON.—A letter from Hilton Head, dated last Friday, says:

"Gen. Sam. Jones, the rebel commander at Charleston, on being notified by Gen. Foster of his intention to place the six hundred rebel prisoners on Morris Island, replied that such a course would not accelerate or impede the action designed by the rebel authorities with reference to the Union men at Charleston. Gen. Jones declared to General Wessels and others that the prisoners in Charleston were considered simply in transitu, and he has since stated that when a proper place can be prepared away from the city, the prisoners shall be taken thither. He refused to transmit to Gen. Foster the names of the Union officers in Charleston.

The rebels on board the Crescent have deluded themselves with the belief that they are to be speedily exchanged. I can tell them, and all who are interested in their welfare, that Gen. Foster, so far as he is concerned will not listen to their exchange so long as our men are confined in Charleston. Before this letter reaches its destination, the rebel prisoners will be under rebel fire on Morris Island. How long they will remain there depends wholly upon the course of the rebel authorities in regard to our men in Charleston."
