 factors of carriages, road wagons and buggies, have an exhibition in their own pavilion, just north of Floral hall, that does great credit to them, and was inspected by the thousands who visited the fair and admired by all. Their sample goods on exhibit are such as they are offering for sale every day, and command approval from all, not on account of their excellence of finish alone, but from their fine proportions and general taste of construction. Their goods are in point of fact built on strict mechanical principles and proportions, and every inch of timber is selected and perfectly seasoned. Their work is all made under the immediate eye and supervision of the proprietors themselves, and is strictly warranted. They make a specialty of the construction of liver and doctor's work. Probably no finer carriage was ever exhibited at any fair than the fine Brewster end spring shown by them built for a Minneapolis party. The factory was established eight years ago, since which time their business has been constantly enlarging until at present it has assumed very important proportions. PATENT ON THE USE OF WATER.

There is no patent on the silo and on the way of filling it, and there were hopes that patent-right sharps would leave farmers free to manufacture ensilage out of any material and in any manner they found profitable. But an enterprising citizen of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., has obtained a patent for moistening corn-stalks, straw and other dry or partially dry substances, before or after they are put into the silo. The claim is a very broad one. It embraces wetting, moistening, sprinkling or saturating dry or partially dry vegetable substances by means of water or steam before or after they are cut, or before or after they are put into the silo. The object to be attained is the restoration of the water that has escaped during the process of ripening or drying in the field before the time of harvesting. The patentee informs the public that ensilage secured in the early part of the season is likely to settle, and that it is desirable to fill up the silo with other material during the fall. This, he thinks, can be accomplished by the use of corn-stalks, straw and other dry fodder, provided farmers purchase the right to throw some water on the mass. There may be some merit in the plan, but it is not likely that these substances will make very good food. Neither is it likely that the inventor will succeed in "getting a corner" on the use of water to moisten corn-stalks, or any other kind of poor fodder. Rains are coming during the fall, and they will descend on stray corn-stalks both before and after they are cut up, and before and after they are placed in the silo. No damages for infringing a patent can be collected from a farmer who allows some fodder to get wet in a storm or shower, or who neglects to put a rubber covering over his shocks of corn, or to draw a roof over his silo. —Chicago Times.
